POINTS FROM THE COUNCIL MEETING

The continued expansion of the gypsy caravan site in Combs Lane was discussed at length. Feeling was still running high amongst local residents following the refusal of planning permission for the site by the District Council. The extensive business use of the site was emphasised. Wholesale laying of hardcore had destroyed the ecological value of the site. Highway warning posts with reflectors had been erected incorrectly at the site entrance so as to be misleading to drivers using Combs Lane in fog conditions. Council was informed that a road accident had occurred involving a lorry using the site entrance and a motor-cycle.

Council decided to bring these and other recent developments to the attention of the County and District Councils, the MP for Eye and local representatives and again urge action to stop the continuing development and expansion of the site.

The road markings at the junction of Valley Lane and Jacks Lane are to be corrected so that traffic from Jacks Lane has to give way to road users in Valley Lane.

The Council is still seeking an Old People's Welfare Representative for the village.

A letter from Onehouse Parish Council expressing concern over the low level of water in the Rattlesden river was discussed. The river had been transformed from a fish-bearing river to a sluggish stream without fish by the lowering of the weir at Burford Bridge and dredging upstream of the weir carried out by the Water Authority in 1970. Council decided to seek the views of those in the parish with land adjacent to the river. The Onehouse Council wished to see a good depth of water in the river for use in emergencies, e.g. fires.

Council was given a summary of the latest position concerning the already publicised improvements at the Pettward Hall. It approved in principle two additional schemes for the Hall: firstly the conversion of the toilet at the rear of the Hall into a toilet which could be used by the disabled (1981 being the Year of the Disabled) and, secondly, use of the Job Creation Scheme to extend the facilities by allowing access from the main hall to the kitchen via the old 'stoke hole'

Work on the play area site at the Chestnuts was due to commence on 1st August now that the distraction of the Royal Wedding celebrations were over.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Friday, 9th October, 1981 at 7.30 pm.
