PLANNING CONSULTATION

The District Council has further clarified its policy concerning notification of planning applications to neighbouring properties. The inspecting officer is left to assess the implications of any proposal and the proposal really must have some detrimental effect to warrant notification. The District Council says "it must be noted that even where it is felt that some detrimental effect is involved, this still may not be sufficient to refuse planning permission. The planning procedure must be seen to act fairly not only to neighbours but also to applicants."

The Parish Council has decided that in order to give reasonable publicity to planning applications concerning the parish, copies of the list of planning applications registered with the District Council will be posted at various places around the parish. This will enable residents to keep informed of such applications. If any parishioner wishes to make comments to the Parish Council, the presence of such lists indicates that consideration is being given to the relevant applications by the Parish Council.

For the present, a copy of the applications registered will be posted on the Pettiward Hall and Oak Close noticeboards and on the tree at the entrance to Boyton Hall Drive, Combs Lane. . If anyone wishes for a copy to be posted elsewhere, please let me know and I will make the necessary arrangements.
