PARISH COUNCIL

Points from the Council Meeting (26th November)

The Council has expressed its growing concern to the District Council over the situation at the gypsy caravan site in Combs Lane following the newspaper report that the land had been sold.

It was agreed to bring the attention of the District Council to the change of use of land situated next to the Blll5 road opposite Home Farm which had been turned into a waste tip.

The Council decided to raise the sum of £2,240 by way of parish rates during 1983/34. A rate of 4.7p in the £ will be levied. Included in the sum is an allocation for the continuing Pettiward Hall improvement work equivalent to a 2p in the £ rate.

Application was made for the provision of 6 footpath signposts available free from the County Council. These will be erected signposting paths which meet the metalled carriageway of roads in the parish.

The damaged play equipment on the Chestnuts rlay area is to be repaired.

Provision of telephone directories in adjacent areas

The National Association of Local Councils wrote to British belecom following their decision to stop issuing free directories of neighbouring areas to subscribers. In reply, British Telecom set out their general policy on the matter and state that as one answer to the problem they sometimes print directory entries in more than one directory. Directories are also provided free of the basic charge to customers living within 10 miles of the boundary of the adjacent area; they can be collected free of charge from the Telephone Area Office, or delivered subject to a handling charge. British Telecom stress they are always prepared to be flexible and General Managers will interpret the rules sympathetically in the light of each customer's circumstances.
