INTER VILLACE SPORTS COMPETITION 1984

The Mid Suffolk Inter Village Sports Tournament for 1984 will be held at the Mid Suffolk Sports Centre, Stowmarket on the weekend 14th/15th April. Closing date for entries is 29th February.

Each village can enter a team consisting of adult and junior (under 16) sections and separate team members to participate in the 5 main sports:

badminton (adult and junior teams each of 1 male and 1 female) darts (adult team of 4 including at least 1 female) netball (adult and junior squad each consisting of up to nine females) table tennis (as for badminton) 5-a-side football

Team members also come together in a relay final.

A new rule this year allows small adjoining villages to enter a combined team. In the past Great Finborough has not entered a team because of insufficient team members or an organiser. A suggestion has been made that Great Finborough combine with the Buxhall team for the mutual benefit of both parishes.
