Thor, the mighty rain god was around so the harvest must be early because of the rain damage. The menfolk got fed-up in the evenings. "Was haet?" said the storyteller. "What is the reason? I thought that only one or two would greet me!" Just then a shower of rain started. "Mighty Thor is the reason, I see" he said. "One cold wind and the frost giants will be here". When the menfolk arrived the women were preparing a great feast. The men went to the great hall, the women came in with the great feast and the merrymaking began. The scouts of war came home and reported on any strange sightings of invaders. The storyteller told tales from faraway lands. More wonders he knew of than five thousand men! The next morning he left to lift more heavy hearts, but he would not be seen in the village again for six weeks.
