On Jordan's Bank

During Advent, the four weeks before Christmas, the altar frontels are changed to mauve, as they are in Lent, marking it a season of penitence – a fact often forgotten in the cheerful bustle leading up to Christmas. Penitence is a bit out of fashion these days, and if all it is thought to mean is sheer gloom 'n woe for its own sake, like those terrible Victorian hymns full of blood and anguish, then good riddance. But cool self examination, which means more or less the same thing, is a more neutral word, and a touch of that from time to time does no harm at all. For instance, I have been musing this week on why many of the things I love most – cricket, warm flat beer, the Church of England, my own company, competent females, tapicca pudding, singing, intelligent conversation – are things that are generally disliked or ridiculed. I once read 'a survey' that showed how clergy were, in their boyhood, more than likely to be loners (and therefore, one presumes, less likely to be sensitive to those around them). Food for thought there, but never mind me – how is your penitence getting along this Advent season? For the doctrine goes that you can sing carols till you are hoarse, but only those that are utterly honest with themselves, ie the truly penitent, will ever actually see the Christ child. It's an uncomfortable truth, but there were only believers at the manger.

Each of us must do our own homework on that one, but one penitential thought for all of us probably is that Christmas is above all a time for hope but that most of us reckon ourselves too worldly-wise, too 'grown up' to hope – that's for kids and simpletons. We've seen too much, grown too hard to hope for impossible dreams. Like, for instance, that the cold war would suddenly stop, the Berlin wall would come numbling down and Communism be virtually dismantled within the space of a month. It's not wimpish to hope. On the contrary, it's a sign of maturity. It's the scared child in us that daren't hope. Happy Christmas – and a thoughtful Advent.

PETTIWARD HALL

The Management Committee has just reviewed hiring charges for 1990. I am pleased to report that in 1989 we anticipate that, in line with our objective that running costs should be covered by hire revenue, income from hirings should exceed outgoings for the first time in many years. (In recent years hiring fees have necessarily been augmented by fund-raising to cover costs). Although this position is generally favourable, there is no room for complacency because with an ageing building there will always be a need to provide funds for maintenance - the roof is increasingly a problem and woodworm has been spotted in the back room. However, increases in hire charges have been kept to a reasonable minimum, so that with effect from 1st January 1990 general hire fees will be as follows (different rates may apply to village organisations):

The deposit applicable to private hirings remains at £50.
