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POINTS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING, 29TH NOVEMBER 1989

Proposed development of Recreation Facilities

Brian Nicholls, Recreation Officer with Mid Suffolk District Council, attended the meeting to provide some guidance on the management of the proposed recreation facilities in the village. The following points were made:

(a) 'All weather' facilities tended to generate demand and were becoming more widely used throughout Suffolk by both adults and children. A suitable surface would be 'wetpour' or interlocking tile. A low wall around the surface would increase the versatility of the area – fencing to the ground was not recommended because of the problem of maintenance.

(b) Councillors were concerned that the management of the facilities should not become a burden for the village, with limited management resources available. Mr Nicholls favoured some form of booking arrangement for the hard surface to ensure that proper use was made of it.

(c) Floodlighting was discussed, as this had been opposed at the meeting when facilities were discussed. Mr Nicholls felt that the absence of floodlighting would limit the use of the surface.

(d) The District Council could assist in promoting sporting activity in the village by providing teachers who could organise activities to get them started off and also by loaning equipment.

(e) Mr Nicholls would forward an information pack on equipment and the organisation of children's play areas.

(f) The Parish Council emphasised its interest in the 'conservation area' to be included in the package. It was felt that local schools should be encouraged to participate in any planting and management of this.

The scheme had not been considered by the District Council in November as first anticipated so a planning application and more detailed costings would not be made until February 1990 at the earliest.

Combs Lane

The Parish Council had writen earlier in the year to the County Surveyor expressing concern over the condition of Combs Lane and the numerous accidents that occurred. A reply was received stating that substantial highway improvements were not envisaged in the foreseeable future. However he was arranging for the site of the S-bend to be re-examined and if minor remedial measures were appropriate (e.g. reflector posts) they would be carried out in the current financial year. Otherwise consideration would be given for inclusion in next year's accident remedial programme.

The next meeting of the Parish Council is on Wednesday 24th January 1990, 7.30 pm at the Pettiward Hall.
