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PARISH COUNCIL

It was reported that wet rot was affecting some windows at the Pettiward Hall as well as there being widespread woodworm infestation.

Buxhall Parish Council had supported the suggestion of a site meeting to discuss solutions to the traffic hazards associated with the B115 road and School Green. The Headteacher at the Primary School is to approach parents again asking them to desist from indiscriminate parking outside the school.

Council comments to the District Council on the Mid Suffolk (South) Local Plan included a request for a new settlement boundary to be drawn around the hamlet centred on Borough Lane and, in addition, the main village settlement boundary to be redrawn to exclude the St. George's complex and the Broad Oak grounds.

A donation of £30 was made to the Suffolk Accident Rescue Service.

At its next meeting on Tuesday 8th May 1990 (7.30pm) the Parish Council will give consideration to organising a survey of the condition of footpaths and the extent of signposting in the parish. Assistance is requested from interested parishioners. The objective of the survey is to create a record which can be used as a basis for improvement of the footpath network so that they can be utilised for recreation.

You are warmly invited to the Benefice Service on the last Sunday of this month. On fifth Sundays all three congregations (in theory) come to one church, which hosts its own choice of service. Being termtime, and with a healthy contingent of Guides & Brownies, Finborough (whose turn come this month) are opting for a Family Service. It usually works very well.

I draw your attention to this as there are suddenly larger numbers of small children now at the church end of the village. We discussed this at the church AGM last night and decided that (a) we very much want to help parents bring up their children in a sane and safe environment and (b) that our contribution probably lies in providing flourishing family services rather than a Sunday School. There is a lot more that could be said, but if you feel this way whether a parent or not then do come along. At present even the family services are far too much a one man band. Full encouragement will be given to letting the youngsters have their say, within a structured act of worship.

One of the first side effects of this would be to bring some village children into our choir. Those who heard the choir on Easter Day pick the correct note out of thin air, sing *This Joyful Eastertide* unaccompanied and begin the hymn, still dead in tune, will have no doubt that we have a much better than average singing tradition at Finborough. Sight-reading modern music takes all the wits you've got; it's an excellent discipline for children, and I have no time for the awful English prejudice that thinks singing is a wimpish activity. The Scots and the Welsh, who are arguably more rugged than the English, have no such silly notions.

There was an 'Ancient v. Modern' discussion on the Today programme the other morning

between Bishop ('call me Bill') Westwood and a member of the Prayer Book Society. With respect, both missed the point, but because it is an issue that is relevant to our village life, not just church life, it may be worth a couple of remarks. The argument is not the beautiful language of Cranmer's Prayer Book versus the friendliness of the new services. It's surely a tension between the two things we are all searching for in life: depth and immediacy. We all want to feel involved in whatever we're doing, no longer content to do things just for duty's sake, want our experiences to be immediately interesting and enjoyable (hence the appeal of the new services, where everyone's jumping up and down like kangaroos). But enjoyability isn't everything: when you've finished feeding your face and having a good time, what's left? (This is my conception of hell - not the idea that a trail of unforgiveable offences lands you in the Great Sin Bin under our feet, but that when you subtract from a person his job, his Friday pint at the local and his holiday slides of Benidorm, there's nothing left. He has so soaked himself in triviality that there's nothing there to save. Many an intelligent mother has confided to me that since surrounding herself with nappies and carrycots she has become a mindless nobody. That's unjust, though. Bringing up a child is the most meaningful act there is.) But hence anyway the appeal of the Prayer Book services, where there is at least the feeling that something's going on which is bigger than ourselves. Leaving religion out of it, only you can judge whether your life, week by week, is becoming richer or more trivial.

I felt it was a bit sad that Serena (your editor) had to go charging round the village trying to drum up copy for this month's newsletter. It's not my place to solicit material, but to fill up the back page, I am reprinting an old Ordnance Survey map of 150 years ago, in the hope that it may prompt a few reminiscences of how things were in the past. Not as long ago as that, of course, not even Bob Proctor can go back that far!
