Thought for the Times

I happened to be reading a bit of Genesis the other day as the latest Gulf update was pouring out of the radio, and reflected on how the Adam & Eve myth might benefit from a bit of an update itself. As I hope you are aware, only a very small minority of Christians believe that the Adam & Eve stories represent a historical account of what actually happened to the first actual man and woman. Unfortunately most people outside the Church think that's what we all believe - and therefore dismiss us, and the bible, as not worth bothering about. But that is a big mistake. The early chapters of Genesis were a brilliant attempt to put the causes of this world's miseries in order of importance, wrapping it all up in a

charming story about apples, fig leaves, talking snakes and what-have-you. Top of the list, with Adam's munch on the Golden Delicious, they put sheer egotistical self-will (echoes of Frank Sinatra's *My Way*, and of Saddam Hussein's megalomania, for that matter). The second worst cause of our ills, according to the Hebrews, was 'passing the buck', never admitting responsibility for anything we do wrong ('... the woman - *she* gave me to eat', and listen to any pair of motorists after a traffic accident). Then came naked aggression (Cain and Abel - man killing his [brother] man). Plenty of evidence around us to support that one, too, but listening to the radio especially recently, have you not noticed the depressing way how everyone involved in the Gulf War believes *simply what they want to believe* - no more, and no less. Dialogue is impossible in those circumstances. And now that I have drawn your attention to it, do you not see the same blinkered views all round you, day by day? The cheap crack is often made that religion has caused more wars than any other factor. I don't think that's wholly true - the N. Ireland Prot-Catholic battle is drawn up along tribal, not religious lines - but if there is truth in it, it is surely due to this factor, of people only believing what they *want* to believe, irrespective of the facts, and that is something we see equally outside the Church.

If I were appointed to update Genesis, I think I'd slip that one in at about number three, with Adam, Eve and all their offspring being issued with monovision spectacles, each able to see one thing only.
