CHURCH ROAD - RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT

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Following on from my letter to the Mid Suffolk District Council regarding the above proposal I have received the following response :-

Dear Mr Grave,

Thank you for your letter of June 8th concerning the above proposal for which outline planning permission has been granted to use access onto Church Road. I am aware of the views of a number of local residents about the means to access to this land and various other considerations that have been expressed.

The fact of the matter is that the local planning authority reacts to planning applications as they are submitted and does not look for alternative solutions if it finds those proposals satisfactory. I have yet to be approached by any developer to say that a problem exists which needs an alternative solution. You may be correct in your comparison over the two possible means of access but this still leaves a developer with the choice of which pieces of land he includes in his solution of how the land should be developed and then putting that in front of the local planning authority.

I hope these comments are of some assistance to you. and pitch provide a second balls to a second

The Parish Council along with interested residents are able to make comments on planning applications which effect the area. Notices of all meetings are advertised on the public notice board outside Pettiward Hall. Members of the public are able to attend, but are not permitted to make comments unless invited to do so by the Chairman of the meeting. As a matter of local policy the Parish Council try to inform those who are considered most directly concerned to enable them to see the plans locally rather than travelling to Needham Market. However it is stressed that if a resident wishes to make any detailed comments these should be forwarded to the local planning authority being, Mid Suffolk District Council, Council Offices, High street, Needham Market.
