### Report From Parish Council Meeting, 5 November Temporary site access, Valley Lane

37 residents attended the last Parish Council meeting when the Council considered a petition from residents in Valley Lane and Jack's Lane, expressing concern about the temporary access for construction purposes to the development site between Valley Lane and Middlefield Drive. Councillors – who have an obligation to act on behalf of the whole community, without fear or favour - considered the various points made by residents from all around the site and agreed the following actions. To:

- Contact the road safety officer for advice
- Contact Peter Blemings to provide road signs for the site
- Consider an in/out route via Valley Lane and Middlefield Drive in consultation with Highways and the developer
- Contact SCC re a traffic management survey/ plan
- Request pavement outside The Old Forge
- Ask for a final date for the conclusion of the project
- Request access to the lower fields so children can play safely there
- Ask the developer to provide a temporary car park before developing the rest of the site
- Advise residents in Valley Lane and Middlefield Drive of the action agreed and follow up in the next newsletter.
- Put future Parish Council meeting dates in the newsletter"

The Parish Council has no hesitation in confirming that the access to the development site is indeed temporary: apart from the fact that the access is subject to a two-year licence from the Highways Authority, the guarantee of its temporary nature is that there will be a footpath between the new development and Valley Lane, which will be passed to the Parish Council to administer on completion of the development.

The matter will be considered further at the full Parish Council meeting on Monday, 7 January 2008 at 7.30pm in the Pettiward Hall.

### Enforcing the village speed limit

The Council also considered speeding through the village following a potentially serious accident involving a member of the village school teaching staff. It was agreed that we should pursue new options to enforce the speed limit through the village, ideally leading to the prosecution of offenders to give a clear message that speeding in Great Finborough is not an option and we are in contact with the Police in this regard.

# Information from Suffolk County Council

# Reconstruction of Edgecomb Road Culvert, Stowmarket

Stage 1 - Single lane of vehicles on Combs Lane controlled by traffic signals.

- Stage 2 Combs Lane to be closed for a 2 3 day period, where the Contractor will be working extended hours to minimise traffic disruption. The road closure is currently programmed to begin on the 3<sup>rd</sup> December. There will be no left turn out of Edgecomb Road for the duration of the road closure.
- Stage 3 Single lane vehicles on Combs Lane controlled by traffic signals. There will be no right turn into Edgecomb Road from Combs Lane and no left turn into Combs Lane from Edgecomb Road.

The alternative route for vehicles while Combs Lane is closed will be via the B1115 Finborough Road - Tavern Street - Station Road West - A1308 Gipping Way - C439 Needham Road and vice versa.

### News from Your District Councillor – John Matthissen

This month's report is all about recycling, inspired by a visit to the Material Reclamation Facility (MRF) at Great Blakenham. A huge quantity of materials is flowing through every day, and Mid Suffolk's recycling rate is now 40% of household waste. Sounds good, and it is one of the best in Britain, but to match the continental rates of 65% to 70% we have a long way to go.

There are two ways of improving our recycling :

1. Everyone remembering to put all their paper, card, cans and plastic food containers into the Green Bin

2. NOT putting in the Green bin the materials that cannot be sorted by the impressive machinery at the MRF. The particular items that cause confusion include carrier bags, plastic bread bags, crisp packets, shredded paper, plastic toys, computer disks and cassettes, and anything that is very dirty. Tetra-paks are not wanted. but can be taken to the Household Waste site at Stowmarket when you have saved a lot of them.

Sometimes a whole lorry of recycling materials is rejected by the MRF because there is too much "contamination" by which they mean the wrong materials. That whole load goes to landfill

It is a sad fact that most of the people working at the MRF spend their time removing wrong materials such as those listed, so that they do not clog the many clever machines that actually sort the contents of our bins into separate streams that can be baled up and sold - paper, cardboard, three types of plastic, steel and aluminium emerge separately from the MRF, and successful recycling also significantly reduces our carbon footprint.

At last Mother Nature seems to realize that winter means storms and frost and they are slowly starting to inflict themselves on our gardens. # Play your part to keep safe on darker nights

Falling crime figures show Suffolk is getting even safer, but the darker evenings can make us feel more vulnerable, especially those who live alone. During the busy festive season we need to be extra careful to keep ourselves, our households and our neighbours safe and secure so that we can all enjoy the celebrations. Here are some seasonal safety tips and useful contacts:

### Your home

- Don't leave your home in darkness leave a light on using a timer switch and draw the curtains at night.
- Fit a visible burglar alarm and outside lighting. Keep shrubs and hedges cut back.
- \* Lock all doors and windows and secure fences, gates and sheds
- Dispose of present boxes carefully don't advertise what's new in your house
- Check smoke alarms, electric blankets and festive lighting are working properly.

### Personal Safety

- Never open your door to unexpected callers, without checking they are genuine. Ring a neighbour or the police first if you are unsure.
- \* Keep your mobile phone battery topped up and put in a taxi contact number. Consider buying an audible attack alarm.
- Make sure you are visible to drivers wear reflective clothing, use cycle lights or carry a torch
- \* Limit how much money and valuables you carry. Avoid using cash machines late at night. Have your keys ready when you are approaching your car or home.
- \* Park in busy, well-lit car parks near CCTV cameras. Keep valuables out of sight. www.saferparking.com lists police approved car parks
- \* Where possible, don't walk alone after dark. Plan your route. Avoid isolated stops and sit near the driver or other passengers. Never accept lifts from strangers.

# From the Team

### Dear Friends,

As I write, as yet I have picked up none of the usual rows that crop up during December about whether charity shops should put up nativity scenes, or conversely how Christians can protect their feast from the nasty commercialisation of Christmas; but I am confident that it will come.

But it occurs to me that the blurring of one mid-winter feast into another is as old, probably, as the human race. Many of you I'm sure already know that much of what we recognise about Christmas was put together by the Roman Emperor Constantine in the 4<sup>th</sup> century AD who conflated the Biblical accounts with many of the pagan practises of the two major Roman midwinter festivals including the Roman festival of light. (The element of decorating the house with various forms of evergreen is of course taken from the paganism of northern Europe.)

Constantine's intent, as I see it, was that as human beings we find the darkness of winter deeply depressing, even in these days of plentiful artificial light. We need lights and jolity and a party to cheer us up as I think some primeval part of us still fears that the sun may not ever grow strong again. Constantine however rooted that need for light and hope in the birth of Christ who is, as John's Gospel writes, "The true light, which enlightens everyone". "What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome

it."<sup>2</sup>

form of jollity – decorating the house, open fires, parties, singing, presents and as much light as we can resource (neighbours permitting!) and it doesn't really matter what the excuse is. But there is another kind of darkness, the darkness of the soul, of selfishness, pride, violence and "man's inhumanity to man"<sup>3</sup>. It is from this darkness that Christ offers us relief. For to all who receive him, who believe in his name, he gives power to become children of God.<sup>4</sup> And it is in the hope of this that amongst all the business of Yuletide, we come to church to celebrate the night that God entered the darkness of this world so that we might enter his light.

The darkness that gets under our skin as the longest night approaches is a darkness that we can flee from in any
