

Parish Council Report Temporary site access, Valley Lane

At the Parish Council on 7 January the outcome of the actions agreed at the November Parish Council were reported, as follows:

- The County Road Safety Officer had attended site and had offered advice but there was no clear view as to whether site access via Middlefield Drive or Valley Lane was safest. Neither presents an ideal solution, but it was important that the safeguards the developer had proposed to minimise inconvenience for residents were observed.
- The developer has agreed road signage with the Highways Authority.
- Both the Road Safety Officer and the County Council Highways Department had advised that they could not support a traffic management survey or plan: their view was that potential traffic in the vicinity did not warrant it.
- We have requested a pavement outside The Old Forge, although action is only likely in the foreseeable future if the Parish Council is prepared to at least part fund it. The Council agreed in principle to proceed, subject to trying to cover the costs through grant support.
- The subject of a final date for completion of the development has been raised with the Developer. His intention is to complete within two years, although this could be impacted by housing market conditions. The Parish Council agreed that it would not expect to see the temporary site access exist past its current two year licence.
- We also asked the Developer if temporary access to the lower field could be granted for children to play. This was considered, but is not possible on safety grounds.
- In principle, the Developer is happy to consider progressing the car park for contractors to park.

Final proposals on site landscaping were also considered by the Parish Council and the first phase of the development is now expected to start shortly. **Richard Brice**

The Annual General Meeting was held in January. Those elected to form the committee were:

- Sue Green is the Parish Council representative on the committee.

Richard Brice was elected Chair and Sue Green Vice Chair. No secretary or treasurer was elected at the meeting. These elections were deferred until the next meeting. No potential co-opted members were forthcoming at the meeting.

It was agreed that the group should be renamed The Great Finborough Community Council but the Charity Commission must give approval.

Team Finborough (youth group) is up and running very successfully. It was noted that the future success of this group, which meets in the Pettiward Hall every Thursday evening depends on more adult helpers coming forward.

Risk assessments have been carried out on Pettiward Hall. The next step in moving on with the project to determine its future is to seek the services of an architect for advice.

Construction of the 40 houses in Middlefield Drive has commenced. The associated village facilities (the playground, car park and football pitch) will be commenced in the near future. The plan for the playground has been approved. The next meeting of the group is listed in the Village Diary.

The Future of Stowmarket

This is a subject that affects all of us living locally, as the market town is a centre for health and education services, as well as shopping, transport and much more. One of my roles at Mid Suffolk District Council is on the committee over-seeing the work of planning the town's future. This reaches another significant stage with publication about now of a draft Masterplan. A summary leaflet should be available at the beginning of March. The document will be in libraries and council offices, as well as on the web – you should be able to find it from:

Recycling

Previous information about recycling issues has drawn a good response, so another item to help direct material away from land fill. From July 2007, Waste Electrical and Electronic equipment – TVs, computers, phones, toasters, hair dryers, microwaves etc. – must be disposed of properly. Retailers and manufacturers are contributing to the costs, and all such equipment should be taken to the Household Recycling Centre ("The Dump") near the football ground in Stowmarket, or any of the other similar centres around the county. This will make better use of the materials, and also stop hazardous substances going to land fill.

Of course, it might be better to seek out a repairer or take the equipment to the British Heart Foundation shop in St Matthew's Street, Ipswich if it is less than 5 years old. Still working? What about Freecycle?

Community Safety

Suffolk County Council is working with district and parish councils and partners to improve community safety and tackle anti-social behaviour problems across the county, and local people are being encouraged to play their part in making Suffolk safer.

To raise awareness, a series of short articles about common issues have been prepared for publication in parish magazines and community newsletters, with local examples and contacts where possible.

Suffolk County Council community safety article 5: Play your part in reducing cycle crime

Cycle crime is an ongoing problem. The number of cyclists is increasing as people look to improve their health, avoid congestion and reduce emissions. As more of us use cycles, it is vital we ensure they are kept secure at all times. In the year 2006/2007 there were 1,759 cycles reported cycle thefts across Suffolk. Tracker bikes fitted with GPS satellite tracking equipment are being used by Suffolk Police across the county to deter and catch cycle thieves, who may be frequent offenders. Five simple steps to protect your bike:

- **Lock it** wherever you are even within a secure shed or garden
- **Secure it** with good quality security locks such as the hardened D-shaped


• **Mark it** – using a UV pen to write your postcode and highlight this fact with

stickers

- **Record it** registering your bike with <u>www.immobolise.com</u>

Thanks to all of you who purchased seed in our 'emergency mini order' in February as a result of which Great Finborough and District Garden Club were able to make a donation of £17.00 to EACH – the children's hospices.

We will be placing our next order in March and are offering this to non-members at the prices shown below. Sunflower based products have increased in price. Please note that the price for Sunflower kernels is based on the 20kg sacks which are available today. If larger sacks are supplied then we will have to make an extra charge on collection.

The one bit of good news is that fatballs are being supplied loose in boxes of 100 rather than in 6 packs. This has reduced the price by a third, and we have no packaging to throw away when you order as many as you need!

To place an order please let me have your requirements together with a cheque to "Great Finborough Garden Club". Orders may be posted or delivered to Abbey Farm Cottage (IP14 3AU). If it is more convenient deliver your order either to 1, Valley Lane or 8, High Road. Orders must be received by 13 March as the order will be placed on 14 March. 
- Do you enjoy rising to a challenge?

From the Ministry Team

I was not sure whether to be shocked or entertained when I popped into the supermarket on Boxing Day and saw Easter eggs on the shelves! When they subsequently disappeared for a couple of weeks I concluded that either it had been someone's joke or else the computer had calculated the date for putting them in and a human being somewhere had decided that perhaps it was a *little* close to Christmas...

Still, as we now approach Easter in earnest it cannot be denied that for most people the key characteristic of the feast is the consumption of vast quantities of egg shaped chocolate - often as the conclusion of 46 days abstinence from that same confectionary. In fact it feels as if the Lenten fast was simply a prelude to the indulgence.

Leaving aside the discipline of fasting for a moment, part of the inescapable nature of Easter is that sudden abundance. The churches, bare all Lent, burst into flower. Our lips (in church anyway) sealed to the great celebration. 'Alleluias' are suddenly caught in an endless chorus of Alleluias and yes, we go home to feast and toast our joy.

This matches the weal and woe of our lives. We all go through times of blessing and times when we feel we have been cursed. Times of great emotional energy; times when we feel we are in our heart's wilderness. Times of confidence; times of uncertainty. So also times of fasting and times of feasting. Times of introspection and times of celebration.



It was Julian of Norwich, a 14th century mystic who saw clearly this facet of the human condition and she writes: ...in times of joy I might have with St Paul: 'Nothing shall separate me from the love of Christ.' And when in pain, I might have cried out with

St. Peter: 'Lord, save me for I perish.' This vision was shown to my understanding ... For God wants us to understand that it is he who keeps us surely whether we be in woe or weal.

And so it is with the Easter story. It is the same God that we follow from the garden of tears to the empty tomb. It is the same God we worship from our terror at the death of God to our great joy at his victory over death. In death and in life, in sadness and privation and in joy and abundance; God is with us.

I hope, then, you eat your eggs this year with delight in the knowledge that the God who made the cocoa bean enjoys our joy, just as much as he suffered with you in its lack!

God be with you this Eastertide.


Women's World Day of Prayer

Services for Holy Week and Easter

The build up to Easter begins on 9th March on **Passion Sunday** when we shift our

focus from our Lenten observances to the story of Jesus' suffering and death. The services on that day will include the reading of the Passion narrative and in Finborough and Onehouse that reading will be dramatised. Then on **Palm Sunday** on 16th March we recall Christ's entry into Jerusalem and palm crosses are handed out.

On the evening of **Maundy Thursday** (20th March) we remember the last meal Jesus had on earth with his disciples as we share a similar meal at Onehouse Church Room, a powerful reminder of the meaning of that meal.

On the morning of **Good Friday** we process around Onehouse with the cross, stopping to mark Christ's journey. A family workshop at Great Finborough is a chance to discover more about the Easter story in an informal way with a mixture of activities and music. At Harleston, in the afternoon, we remember Christ's last hour in a service that takes us to the heart of the cross.

In the afternoon of **Easter Eve** there is an informal service at Buxhall, the New Fire of Easter, celebrating the new life that Easter brings and which also includes and egg hunt for the children (of whatever age!). Later in the evening Finborough is holding a **Tenebrae** (Latin for *shadows*) service; a service of readings and prayer characterized by the gradual extinguishing of candles.

On **Easter Day** we celebrate first with a dawn communion service; this year at Onehouse. This lighting of the early fire marks the "breaking from the tomb" as the dawn breaks; a

memorable start to Easter Day. Later in the morning there are five communion services: one in each parish. The day is a full day, but rightly so as it celebrates the rising of Jesus Christ from the tomb as God's decisive act in our salvation. Come and celebrate with us.
