Parish Council Report

Middlefield Drive development

Residents will be well aware that construction has now started in earnest at the top of the site. This has resulted in some disruption to residents and has been the subject of discussion with the Developer. We have reminded Gipping Homes of the importance of road management to minimise inconvenience to residents as construction progresses.

Part of the old hedge line, largely comprising briar and scrub, has been grubbed out and replaced with new indigenous hedge and some larger trees in time to benefit from this year's growing season. The Parish Council has also commented to the Planning Authority on the position of the footpath outfall from the site into Valley Lane and asked that it be sensibly relocated.

Negotiations around the provision of a new pavement past the Chestnut Horse and the Old Forge into Valley Lane, to service the Pettiward Hall, have been progressing and the Parish Council has largely secured the necessary funding to make it happen this year. Not only will the path provide safer access to the Hall, but it will also have the effect of narrowing the High Road and we hope reducing the speed of through traffic.

Notwithstanding we are collaborating with other local villages in the acquisition of a speed camera. We anticipate that speeding drivers will soon learn to their detriment that speeding through Great Finborough very definitely does not pay! **Richard Brice, Chairman, Parish Council**

Music at Great Finborough CEVCP School

At Great Finborough Primary we are proud of our musical achievements. The curriculum is enriched with a variety of music opportunities. Our weekly music lessons are delivered by a specialist music teacher, Mrs Lindsey Moye, from the County.

The children were recently selected to perform at the Snape Maltings Concert Hall as part of a 'Celebration of Music'. Our performance included singing, percussion and violins. We performed the Selfish Giant by Oscar Wilde. The children spent the day at Snape Maltings rehearsing before delivering an evening performance. This was a truly magical experience for our children.

Years 3 & 4 children have been busy learning to play the violin. The children have a weekly lesson taught by a specialist teacher. They have made pleasing progress and held a special assembly for parents just before Christmas.

Two recorder clubs take place each week. We have a club for beginners and a second club for children who have been playing for a little longer. Both clubs are doing well.

On a Monday after school we hold a choir led by our music coordinator, Mrs Jane Davy. 15 pupils regularly attend the choir. Mrs Davy sings and performs regularly in a choir herself and this experience and knowledge greatly benefits the children. The choir will shortly be visiting the Royal Festival Hall in London to enjoy watching and listening to a performance called FUNharmonics by the London Philharmonic Orchestra and accompanying choir.

Blue Class (Ages 7-9) will shortly be enjoying learning about African Drumming. The 6 sessions will provide the children with an opportunity to learn how to play the African Drums as well as learning about their history and culture related to them. Last year the children enjoyed a Samba Drumming project.

Desperately keen to learn to play the piano, he was eventually accepted by Oxford University where he gained a degree, moving on to the Royal Northern College of Music, Manchester for his doctorate.

He now works with deaf children teaching them to play an instrument, incredibly forming an orchestra with these children. Full of enthusiasm and humour, he received a well-deserved standing ovation. CATHY'S SPRINGTIME LAMB CASSEROLE

SERVES 4

4 lamb chump chops 1 tablespoon paprika 35g packet spring vegetable soup 8fl ozs dry white wine 16fl ozs water 1 crushed clove garlic 2 small red peppers 2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley 2 medium potatoes, chopped 2 large carrots, sliced 3 medium sticks celery, chopped 2 small green peppers 1½ tablespoons cornflour 2fl ozs extra water

Remove bones from chops, cut meat into cubes, mix well with paprika. Combine dry soup with wine, water, garlic and parsley in ovenproof dish; add lamb, potatoes, carrots, celery and peppers. Bake in moderate oven for about 1 hour (or microwave on HIGH for about 20 mins) or until tender. Blend cornflour with extra water, add to lamb mixture, return to oven for about 15 mins (or microwave on HIGH for about 5 minutes) or until mixture boils and thickens. **Cathy Croome**

From the Ministry Team

'O God please let this work' – how many of us have closed our eyes and crossed our fingers and offered this up at whatever level? I know I've prayed for parking spaces, clear skies, a working boiler. I've prayed for the success of a re-format of my computer, for a lucky turn of the dice, for an early return of my husband from work. It takes, I think, the sternest atheist to resist the instinct to throw such prayers into the ether.

It is a deep rooted instinct when all else has failed to reach out to any other help that might just be out there; but it is an instinct that many deride as childish. This month the Church celebrates Rogation, the counterpart to Harvest, when we pray for the fruitfulness of our fields, our industry, and our lives. We pray for fine weather and a good economic climate. If it is childish, it is a childishness in which the Church rejoices.

Do we believe that our prayers will turn round the tottering economy, end world hunger, or turn our lives around with the efficiency of a magic spell? No. We pray, in part, to remind ourselves that however sophisticated our lives we cannot control most things including the weather; the economy in Japan; or my dog's preference for eating shoes! There is no system, no charm, no philosophy that can provide us with security and happiness: no magic spell for a good day.

When we pray, we not only surrender control and let go of the desperate and hopeless attempt to control the uncontrollable but we climb (as it were) into the lap of our everlasting Father for his comfort and reassurance. When we pray we remember that we are indeed children and our Father loves to give us good things.

Don't dismiss your religious instincts then. Pray boldly for the cake to rise; for the car to start; for the harvest; and for world peace. Your heavenly Father knows you need these things,

but it never hurts to hold his hand, and there's no harm in asking....

Archbishop William Temple used to say, 'When I pray, coincidences happen; when I don't pray, they don't happen.' God bless you then, and your prayers, this month and always.


