Report from the September Parish Council Meeting

The Parish Council is to pursue the closure of Wash Lane to through traffic. When it closed for work a while ago, local residents agreed it would be of benefit for it to be permanently closed to traffic.

The Parish Council hopes to join other local Parishes to purchase a traffic speed camera to help reduce speeding through the village.

The Boundary Committee are looking at reorganising Local Government in Suffolk with either one or two unitary authorities. The Parish council has responded that it does not support the proposals made and is critical of the response time allowed, considering it was over the Summer.

Parish Clerk Vacancy

Lucinda Rogers, our Parish Clerk for five years has resigned to take up full time employment. We wish Lucinda all the best in her new role and thank her for keeping us on the straight and narrow.

Given the above, applications are therefore invited for this paid permanent part-time role servicing the Parish Council. The post will also be advertised in the East Anglian Daily Times.

Applicants should be able to demonstrate they are able administrators. Some knowledge of local government, ideally in a Parish Council context is desirable, though not essential, and training will be provided.

The role involves around 16 hours work a month for pay of £8.04-£9.58 per hour plus reasonable expenses such as telephone and mileage. Parish Council and Planning Meetings

are held during the evening, but follow up actions can be undertaken more flexibly. If you are interested in the role and would like to know more about it, please call Richard Brice. Shortlisted candidates will be invited for interview in the Pettiward Hall on the evening of Wednesday 8 October 2008.

Play Equipment

Final decisions need to be taken on the precise siting of new play equipment within the Play Area opposite the village shop. A final review before the decision is made will take place during week commencing 6 October. The review will be undertaken in public in the Pettiward Hall by Parish Councillors, Richard Brice and Liz Michie. They will hear representations from residents close to the site, as well as the play equipment supplier. The meeting will also consider site landscaping and plans for operating the site. Once the decision is taken the positioning of the equipment will be final. The developer can only then lay the necessary foundations.

Dog fouling

Fortunately the days are long gone when human excrement was dumped in public places, but sadly - and inexplicably - the standards we apply to our own waste is not always carried over to our dogs. Regrettably I've had to write on this subject before and apparently some in our community still regard it as acceptable not to clean up after their dogs, despite the availability of dog bins.

We all have to live together and adhering to reasonable standards is something which the majority can reasonably expect. Most people find dog fouling distasteful. With this in mind, please note, or indeed draw to the attention of dog owners, including those who get others to walk their hound, that patience is wearing thin in some quarters with this issue. The District Council is responsible for enforcing action against the owners of dogs that persistently foul and can prosecute owners and levy fines up to a maximum of £1,000. No one wants this to happen but dog excrement must not be left around the village. Please take this reminder seriously and avoid the situation where one of our own is prosecuted.

2 Million Gallon Reservoir

As part of the usual Planning process, the Parish Council has been invited to comment on an application for Planning Permission by Stowmarket Golf Club (Application no. 2757/08) for the construction of a 2 million gallon Irrigation Reservoir on the field below St Andrew's Parish Church.

This is a potential development of some note for the Parish, with a number of important matters that will require careful consideration. Not least among these are safety, the environment and, of course, the impact both physical and visual on the Grade II listed Parish Church.

The Parish Council will consider its views on the application at a Planning Meeting which will be held in the Pettiward Hall at 7.30pm on Monday 13 October, 2008. Members of the public are welcome to attend and will have the opportunity to express their views before the Council decides how to comment to the District Council.

Details of the application can be viewed online via the Mid Suffolk District Council website (follow the Planning pages), or a hard copy can be viewed by arrangement with me.

Kitchen Waste Scheme

This has unfortunately been deferred, because our partner, Babergh District Council, decided it could not afford to go ahead at present. It seems likely the project will have to await the creation of the new councils in 2010.

Roadside Advertising

There is a general planning prohibition on advertising signs on public roadside verges, and this does include such worthwhile events as village fairs. This rule tends to be applied more strictly according to how major a road is involved, so that trouble was inevitable when signs were put on the A1120 roundabout near Tesco. Please try to find locations on private land, with the owner's permission.

Tree Planting

I have arranged the first Tree Planting session of the winter at

Shelland Green on 2 November at 10am. We will plant black poplars, oaks and hedgerow trees; many donated by local people. Help will be welcome from any local villages. I am hoping to arrange a further planting in the new year; perhaps in Buxhall.

My Opinion on the New Structure of Local Government

I hope you have expressed to the Boundary Committee your opinions on the proposal for Unitary Councils. My preference was to form four councils by merging existing pairs (such as Mid Suffolk and Babergh) and run services like Education as wider partnerships. That did not find favour with the Committee. Whilst we await the outcome, following the period of consultation ended on 26 September, attention should turn to the detail.

I have grave concerns about the proposed structure of local planning committees and community boards by Suffolk County Council senior officers. This model will probably be applied to the preferred Rural Suffolk option or to the One Suffolk scheme (which has not been dismissed).

They appear to be trying to impose structures 'top down' with little reference to elected members. There is a real risk that the responsiveness of the new Council to local parishes and people will be worse than now, as some other Districts appear to pay less attention than MSDC to local views. They propose far fewer councillors so those elected will represent far more people, making it difficult to represent local views in numerous parishes.

If there are particular services that you value, or would like to see more localised, or retained as at present (eg. Aliens invade Great Finborough

Not squatters this time, but a little moth that is causing a huge amount of damage. You may have noticed over the past couple of years that horse chestnut trees locally are turning brown and losing their leaves far earlier than they used to. They are producing very few conkers. The four great trees in our churchyard have been badly hit, but many other trees are suffering too.

The culprit, a moth, is a leaf miner with a very long name. It has a passion for the white flowering horse chestnut in particular. Some of the modern hybrids and brightly coloured varieties don't seem so vulnerable. The pupae tunnel (mine) between the layers of the leaf thereby interfering with the tree's ability to produce chlorophyll. The tree then struggles to maintain its health and vigour – and it certainly doesn't look very pretty.

The leaf miner will not kill the tree, but it can weaken the tree to the point where it becomes susceptible to a rather nasty problem called bleeding canker. That can kill the tree.

The best way to manage the problem is to rake up the leaves as they fall in Autumn and either burn them or dispose of them at the Council's green waste disposal site. The local authority composting system generates far more heat than you can achieve at home so it destroys the moths. To compost them effectively at home cover the leaves with 10cm (8inches) of soil or 30cm (1 foot) of other materials.

Destroying the leaves containing the hibernating pupae in the winter reduces the moth population emerging the following Spring. Any reduction in damage at that time is of greatest benefit. Trees will become re-infested later in the season, but damage later in the year, although unsightly, is less important. At least the trees will have had a chance to build up some strength.


