News from the Parish Council Vacancy: Clerk to Great Finborough Parish Council

As a result of the resignation of the postholder, applications are invited for this paid permanent part-time role servicing the Parish Council. Applicants should be able to demonstrate they are capable administrators: some knowledge of local government, ideally in a Parish Council context is desirable, although not essential, and training will be provided.

Pay is on a scale between £8.04 and £9.58 per hour and the role involves 16-20 hours work per month. Reasonable expenses (eg. telephone and mileage) are also paid. Parish Council and Planning Meetings are held during the evening, but follow up actions can be arranged to suit the successful candidate.

Parish Council

The next Parish Council meeting is the Annual General Meeting. It will take place, with the Annual Village Meeting, in Pettiward Hall on Monday 11 May 2009, starting at 7pm. I look forward to seeing everyone there.

Village Developments

Work on the new car park and children's play area is now progressing apace and it is expected that the car park will open in time for Easter. The play area will take a little longer as the site will be turfed and we need to ensure that the turf has 'taken' before the facility opens. Thanks to Peter Blemings and Neil Beales of Gipping Homes for the way they have collaborated with the Village to make sure that we have great new facilities as a legacy of the Ravenscroft development.

The Triangle opposite the Village School has also been completely refurbished with the setting out of formal parking and the planting of a Tulip tree to set off a much smarter amenity. All these developments have been arranged on your behalf by the Parish and Community Councils, with the lion's share of the costs being met outside the Village.

Welcome to Former Buxhall Neighbours

From 1 April the village boundary with Buxhall changes to bring our former Buxhall neighbours on the High Road, Boundary Cottages, Buxhall Hill and around Borough Lane, formally into the parish of Great Finborough.

The Parish Council's view is that this is a sensible realignment of the parish boundary, correcting an historical anachronism. Although the change is not universally popular it does mean that everyone who lives in the Great Finborough settlement and enjoys the facilities it offers pays the same Council Tax and votes at the same place - in the Pettiward Hall. All Great Finborough residents also benefit from beneficial hire rates for the Hall.

Pettiward Hall Heating

The heaters in the Pettiward Hall have now been in continual use for well over fifteen years and are approaching the end of their useful life. With this in mind, we have been looking at new technology to find a new, cheap and effective heat source for the Hall.

Firstly we looked at geothermal energy and contractors have sunk a small bore hole at the back of the stage. The drill went down through the subsoil and underlying rock to a depth of 360 metres, where it hit a small pocket of gas and oil. This caused quite a mess in the Hall and we have therefore ruled this out as a reliable heat source.

We then looked at the new technologies being developed off the back of the CERN project in Switzerland. With grant assistance from the European Union, the European Energy Commission, we have purchased a small fast breeder reactor, which synthesises unlimited heat through nuclear fusion. The boiler unit is small enough to fit in one of the kitchen cupboards. It is both silent and glows in the dark, thereby reducing our lighting bills.

The unit only produces a small amount of radioactive waste which goes into the normal green recycling bin and is collected fortnightly by the dustmen. On the day that the green bins are emptied, please avoid going near Valley Lane so as to reduce potential exposure. For similar reasons, when putting anything in the green bin outside the Hall, please wear sunglasses. The next waste collection from the Hall is on Wednesday 1 April, just before noon. **Richard Brice**

Community Council Meeting: 23 February 2009 Pettiward Hall Group

The roof in the playgroup area has been repaired but the ceiling still needs work. The piano has been examined and found to have wood worm. It will be disposed of and not replaced although an electronic keyboard may be purchased. It was noted that the stage lights are not working and it was agreed to purchase four tables and ten chairs to replace broken ones.

With evenings getting lighter more outdoor events will take place. There is now a recording mechanism for all incidents and accidents.

Conservation Area

The village school has asked to move the main entrance into the school, which would require the re-alignment of a footpath, to the Oak Close end. This will also have the benefit of discouraging inappropriate parking. The only pedestrian access to the school would be through the new gate.

Rabbit Health Awareness

Most people have heard of Myxomatosis and many have seen 'myxi' rabbits at the roadside. Did you know <u>all</u> rabbits are susceptible including pets that do not mix with wildlife at all? This is because the disease is spread by blood-sucking insects (usually rabbit fleas, but mosquitoes and other biting flies have also been implicated).

'Myxi' causes bulging eyes and swellings are also seen around the rest of the head, as well as around the bottom and sex organs. The facial swellings can lead to blindness and distortion around the face within a day of the onset of symptoms, leading to difficulty with feeding and drinking. In addition to this, secondary bacterial infection often results in fatal pneumonia. Euthanasia is generally recommended, especially given that affected rabbits remain a source of infection for other rabbits. The best course of action is to prevent the disease by vaccination combined with control of parasites.

A dose of vaccine to all rabbits over six weeks of age who are healthy and not pregnant is recommended, ideally in early Spring, so that rabbits have the best protection during the high risk time (late August-October). Boosters are recommended twice a year in areas (like mid Suffolk) where wild rabbit populations are vast, and disease risk is that much higher. A good control programme also includes regular checking for fleas, use of an insecticidal treatment from your vet to reduce bites by fleas and other insects, and nets plus insect repellent are recommended. Your vet will advise as not all products are suitable or safe for rabbits.

The other disease being targeted is caused by *Encephalitozoon cuniculi* (E.cuniculi); a microscopic parasite that can cause head tilt, hind limb weakness, fits, kidney disease and blindness. Treatment with Panacur Rabbit, which contains a drug called Fenbendazole, is effective in preventing E.cuniculi in rabbits. It may also eliminate the parasite, but often, sadly, treatment is too late to eliminate the clinical signs, therefore prevention for this disease is most definitely better than cure. The best recommendation is to use Panacur Rabbit 2-4 times a year to help prevent E.cuniculi. **Ross Kelly**

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From the Ministry Team

Dear Friends, What difference will Easter make for you? Here are some possibilities:

- Lots of chocolate or whatever other indulgences you gave up for Lent.
 An extra hour of daylight in the evenings, as we move into summer time.
- An urge to get into the garden, cut the grass, tidy up the borders and do some Spring planting.
- Time to put away the drab colours and heavy fabrics of winter, and to bring out your Spring wardrobe.
- Beginning to think of holidays or day trips, perhaps getting out your caravan or even your tent, if you're very hardy.

All these are pleasant suggestions, and will no doubt lift the spirits after a long and bitter winter. But there's more to it than that.

Walking in a garden, At the break of day, Mary asked the gardener Where the body lay;

But he turned towards her, Smiled at her and said: 'Mary, spring is here to stay, Only death is dead.'

The first Easter was a life-changing event for all those who experienced it. They could never go back to being the people they had been. The followers and friends of Jesus were devastated when he died; but as they encountered him in the meetings that took place in the weeks following that Easter morning, as they began to realise that in a new and wonderful way, he was still with them, and the power of death had been defeated for ever, they became different people. The new life of Easter is about more than flowers and chicks and blossom – though the rebirth of creation in the Springtime is a welcome reminder of God the Creator making all things new. Easter is about new possibilities for our lives, about all that is dead in us being revitalised, about hope being restored. Even if the bodies we are stuck with for the time being don't function as well as they might, the picture of the risen Jesus, his wounds still visible, is a sign to us that the worst tragedy can be transformed by the power of God – as the blackness of Good Friday was to become the joy of Easter morning.

A wise person wrote: 'What then is resurrection? If it happens to us now, how are we to identify it? What are the signs of its coming? Resurrection as a present miracle does not deliver us from the unevenness and turmoil and fragmentariness of being human. The miracle is to be found precisely within the ordinary round and daily routine of our lives. Resurrection occurs to us as we are, and its coming is generally quiet and unobtrusive and we may hardly be aware of its creative power. It is often only later that we realise that in some way or other we have been raised to newness of life........'

So – what difference will Easter make to you? As you savour all the joys of Springtime and give thanks for all the new life around you, look for the signs of that new life within you, too, and for signs of growth in your own life. And may your Easter be peaceful, happy and full of blessings.

Introduction to the Easter Vigil

"From earliest times Christians have gathered through the night of Easter to recall the story of God's saving work, from creation through to the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. However, the Easter liturgy is not merely a presentation of God's work. It is meant to be a real experience of new life for the worshipper, a passing from darkness to light which offers hope to all the faithful." *Common Worship, Times and Seasons*

The Easter Vigil marks the end of the emptiness of Holy Saturday, and leads into the celebration of Christ's resurrection. The Vigil itself is an hour of quiet reflection and readings as we watch and wait for the Easter joy. It is not necessary to stay for the whole vigil. People may wish just to come for a short time of reflection during the Holy Night. Others may wish to come and follow the salvation story to its glorious conclusion. Participants may wish to bring their own objects for reflection (books, pictures, a cross etc) to help them focus in the silences between the readings.

At Midnight the lighting of the New Fire – the renewed Light of Christ – marks our entry into the Easter celebrations and the singing of the Exsultet, the ancient hymn of triumph and rejoicing, links this night of our Christian redemption to the Passover night of Israel's redemption out of Egypt. The renewal of our baptismal promises strengthens our sense of participation in the death and resurrection of Christ, dying to sin in order to be reborn in him, and celebrates the royal and priestly ministry of the whole people of God. The Easter Gospel is proclaimed with all the joy and splendour that the church can find. The Easter Eucharist provides the climax to this great celebration when we are sacramentally reunited with our risen Lord.

Now the queen of seasons, bright with the day of splendour, With the royal feast of feasts, comes its joy to render. (John of Damascus).
