

News from the Parish Council *Community Facilities*

As the Ravenscroft development progresses we are now actively engaging with the developer over the facilities for older young people on the bottom field. Under the arrangement that we negotiated with the District Council before the land was sold to Gipping Homes, the obligation is to provide a levelled and drained 5-aside football pitch at the bottom of the development. We are now starting to work with the young people to explore what they would ideally like to see and if and how any additional facilities may be funded. We have been successful in funding additional costs of the Play Area through grant aid and expect to look at similar sources, if necessary, for development of facilities on the lower field.

Remember your Pets on 5 November

With the firework season upon us, local vets, The Cedarwood Veterinary Practice of Stowmarket, are providing pet owners with important advice on the care of their animals:

Pets in the house

If you or your neighbours are having fireworks at home, keep your dogs and cats indoors from early evening. Once they are inside, shut cat-flaps and external doors. Give them some space in a room that they are used to and shut the curtains. Music or the television will help distract them from the noise. Check on them regularly and reassure them if frightened. If you have birds in the house, cover the cages and move them away from windows.

If your pets are generally susceptible to stress it is worth talking to your vet. Over recent years medicines and techniques have been developed that can greatly reduce the impact of fireworks noise on animals.

Pets in the garden

Wherever possible bring rabbits and other outdoor pets into or close by the house. It is a good idea to cover the pens, remembering to leave enough air gaps so that they can breathe. Ideally enjoy fireworks at a local organised display such as the forthcoming display at the Museum of East Anglian Life and keep your pets safely at home. Swine Flu

The swine flu vaccination programme will be rolled out over the next few weeks. Once the vaccine has been distributed GP practices will contact members of the community identified as being in the priority groups by letter, inviting them to come forward to have the vaccine before the end of November. The priority groups are listed below and will receive the vaccination in this order:

- 1. People aged over six months and under 65 years in current seasonal flu vaccine clinical at-risk groups.
- 2. All pregnant women, subject to licensing conditions on trimesters.
- 3. Household contacts of people with compromised immune systems eg. people in regular close contact with patients on treatment for cancer.
- 4. People aged 65 and over in the current seasonal flu vaccine clinical at-risk groups but not otherwise healthy over 65s, since they appear to have some natural immunity to the virus.

Vaccination of frontline health and social care workers will begin at the same time and will continue for as long as necessary. Although the virus has so far proved to be mild in most people, for others it has been more serious. By vaccinating these high risk groups first we are aiming to protect those most vulnerable to this virus. Everyone can do their bit to prevent the spread of swine flu, simply by washing their hands properly and regularly.

About swine flu

Most swine flu cases have been mild, with symptoms similar to those of seasonal flu. Only a small number of people have had more serious symptoms. If you or a member of your family has a fever or high temperature (over 38°C/100.4°F) and two or more of the following symptoms, you may have swine flu:

Unusual tiredness
Runny nose
Shortness of breath or cough
Aching muscles
Headache
Sore throat
Loss of appetite
Diarrhoea or vomiting.

It makes sense to have a working thermometer at home, as an increase in temperature is one of the main symptoms. If you are still concerned you may have swine flu, stay at home and check your symptoms using the online National Pandemic Flu Service: www.direct.gov.uk/pandemicflu

Call your GP directly if you have a serious existing illness that weakens your immune system, such as cancer; if you are pregnant; if you have a sick child under one; if your condition suddenly gets much worse or if your condition is still getting worse after seven days (five for a child).

The National Pandemic Flu Service is an online service that will assess your symptoms and, if needed, provide an authorisation number that can be used to collect antiviral medication from a local collection point. For those who do not have internet access, the same service can be accessed by telephone on: 0800 1 513 513 for information; 0800 1 513 100 for treatment.

What to do if you or someone you know needs care or support If you are concerned about an adult who cannot manage at home without more support, or who needs fulltime care instead of living at home, they may be entitled to a service or funding from the Local Authority (LA) or the NHS. Everyone is entitled to a free assessment of their needs by Social Services. Under Fair Access to Care Services each LA works out which levels of identified need it can afford to fund from Council Tax. In Suffolk currently only 'critical' and 'substantial' needs are resourced.

If the person's needs fit into the levels of need the LA will meet, the services they need will be provided directly by LA staff or commissioned from a service provider regulated by the Care Quality Commission. If the person in need of care or support has the means to pay for, or contribute to, their care package this will be determined by a financial assessment. If they choose not to pay the service will not be supplied.

If the person has greater needs than can be met through social care alone, or if they need the care of a Registered Nurse, the NHS will provide directly, or fund the care that is needed. This may be through mainstream services like District Nursing or, if someone meets the criteria for NHS Continuing Healthcare, the NHS will pay for the person's entire health and social care and, if the person cannot live at home, for their accommodation too.

The Primary Care Trust (PCT) will conduct its own needs assessment to determine if the person meets the Continuing Healthcare funding threshold. If someone is at 'end of life' they may well meet the criteria. There is no financial cap above which the NHS will not fund but it has a duty to the public purse to be cost effective. If the person disagrees with the decision the PCT makes regarding eligibility, there is recourse all the way to the Ombudsman.

If a person is in a Care Home with Nursing (Nursing Home) rather than a Care Home (Residential Home) and self-funded or with their placement funded by the LA, the PCT may still make a financial contribution of over £100 per week to the total fee if the person needs a Registered Nurse to provide or oversee their care. Dear Friends,

November is a month for remembering. It begins with the feast of All Souls when we remember with thanksgiving those whom we love who have died. Then there is Guy Fawkes, *Remember*, *remember the* 5^{th} *of November* Followed by Armistice Day and Remembrance Sunday. 
