Big decisions ahead to be made in relation to the best use of the field by the Ravenscroft Development, the future of the Pettiward Hall, and how to encourage Post Office Ltd to re-provide a Post Office – lost to the village since our last newsletter – and support the village shop.

If you know someone newly arrived and living in the village, or neighbours moving on, please let me know. The village welcome pack for new residents is available from me.

News from the Parish Council

At the January meeting of the Parish Council:

- Resolved to set the precept for 2012/13 at £6,327 which would ensure that, for the Parish Council part of the Council Tax there would be no change for Band D properties.
- Decided to purchase a litterbin for the playground and another to go next to the Youth Shelter.
- A keen interest was shown in celebrating the Queens Diamond Jubilee with an event of some kind and it was agreed to make plans at the next meeting.
- Recorded the Council's thanks to the retiring members of the 2011/825 Speed Watch team. Sessions will have to be suspended until volunteers come forward to replace the team.
- A further meeting of the potential allotmenteers will be arranged to gauge the current level of interest before further action is taken to identify a location.
- It was agreed that nothing needs to be done with the fencing and that the existing entrance to the Ravenscroft Development Amenity Land is adequate. It was noted that the handover of responsibility is yet to take place.

Village Shop and Post Office

The Council was informed that the Post Office would close on 12 January. Nigel Edwards informed the meeting that he had resigned from Post Office Ltd in 2009 giving notice to them that the premises would no longer be available. He stated that the Post Office had had two years to find an alternative location but had done nothing forcing Mr and Mrs Edwards to give them notice to quit. It was confirmed that the responsibility lies with Post Office Ltd to provide a service rather than the shop's proprietor.

It was noted that a fulltime Sub Postmaster is costly and the village has not been able to support the cost through its use of the Post Office and shop. It was confirmed the Church has been offered as a possible PO location. Nigel Edwards confirmed the shop would not be closing. It needs the full support of the whole village given the competition posed by the Stowmarket supermarkets. Cllr Otton offered her help, based on her experience of the setting up of Rattlesden's Community Shop and Post Office. It was agreed that the Council would ask Post Office Ltd what it plans to do to re-provide a service to the village. Then a public meeting may be held to gauge support for a Post Office and develop a plan.

News from your District Councillor *Tree Planting*

My target of planting a tree for every re-election vote began in Buxhall recently when 150 native species trees were planted by a group of twelve Green Party members and other local people. The trees, many saved from local gardens, will supplement the major planting schemes around Fasbourn Hall in Valley Lane. They will eventually form a small copse where the footpath leaves Valley Lane heading for Kiln Lane and Brettenham Road.

Mid-Suffolk integration with Babergh

This work continues with the appointment of seven 'tier 3' managers, and much work at departmental level to move to shared working methods and systems. I am a member of the joint IT panel, alongside other Councillors from Babergh and Mid Suffolk.

New Year Village Walk 2012

Eight of us met up outside The Chestnut Horse on a mild and bright morning (2nd January) and set out across the fields to Buxhall Vale, where we met up with ten further walkers from Onehouse. We then took a little-used and picturesque route to the Buxhall Crown, where we were warmly welcomed. We enjoyed some good conversation over a drink and optional lunch before separately returning to our respective villages. Many thanks to Derek Ames, who helped to organise this very successful event. It is such a good way to welcome in the New Year and to enjoy our beautiful countryside and some good company.

The Forge Caravan Site

The result of the public inquiry into The Forge is expected sometime in February. Government has announced that it will provide a grant to Orwell Housing Association to upgrade the site if the compulsory purchase order is successful. I am aware of a range of views of local people on this matter, some understandably very strongly held; and others expressing an interest in having a fuller understanding of the issues. I remain, as always, committed to listening and responding to local views on this and any other matter relevant to our community, and to doing my best to ensure that you are represented. For example I recently lobbied MSDC to take account of local views as a result of which they re-opened negotiations with the landowner and his representatives, although unfortunately the only response was a clearly unworkable counter-offer. You will understand that I am not permitted to publicly disclose any of the owner's commercially confidential information. However if anybody would like a fuller account of my personal recent work in relation to The Forge, then please get in touch and I will be pleased to outline this to you. Celebrating Success

I am delighted to report that the village school has been judged by Ofsted, in December 2011, to be a 'Good school with Outstanding features'. The Church of England inspected the school in January 2012 and found it is 'Outstanding'.

We are particularly pleased that the Ofsted report celebrates the success achieved in the development of our new curriculum which was graded 'Outstanding'. The report recognises that all groups of children make good progress from their starting point and that careful monitoring, good teaching and targeted support are key to this achievement and the overall consistently above average standards achieved year on year. The children all reported feeling safe at happy at school, and parents were very positive about their children's progress. The inspector would now like us to look at how we develop links with other communities to prepare them for living in a multicultural society. He also supports our plans to improve the recreational environment (playground and field).

As staff and Governors we work hard to constantly improve the school and I am delighted that this hard work is reflected in the inspector's comment 'the school never rests on its laurels, but always strives to improve'. 

The John Peel Centre for Creative Arts says thanks a million!

The John Peel Centre for Creative Arts in Stowmarket has won a \pm 500,000 award from Biffa. The Centre will provide a lasting legacy to the life and career of the much-loved and broadcaster who lived in Great Finborough. As well as being a national icon, John Peel was a much-loved member of this community and always supported worthwhile local initiatives. He was renowned for encouraging new music from unlikely sources.

The centre will eventually be a place that offers a lot of things to a lot of people. John had catholic tastes, so it wasn't just about loud music. He played all sorts of music and that's what we will be doing. We will have a state of the art rehearsal and performance space and hope and lots of people will use it. We hope that people who liked John's work will help support the Centre and ensure his legacy lives on. As well as being his widow, I am a patron and Director of the John Peel Centre Community Interest Company.

The Corn Exchange was built in 1985. It housed the 'Assembly Rooms' and apart from agricultural trading, the building was the main venue for the town's big social occasions until its closure in the mid 20th century. Since then, the building has had several uses, none of which made enough of the venue's potential value. It has stood sad and semi-derelict for many years.

The £500,000 funding will enable phase 3 of the building work to begin in May 2012. Work will include new state of the art lighting and sound systems, a new box office, a mezzanine level including a café and bar, sprung flooring, staging and upgraded facilities. The centre will also be upgraded to environmental standards with solar panels, triple glazing, additional insulation and an air source heat pump.

A new programme of events running to May 2012 will be launched shortly including music, spoken word, theatre, family events and comedy. The will also be a number of fundraising activities run to help raise further funding for the centre's future. Hello everyone. I am pleased to say that there are no crimes to report these last two months.

Bogus callers... Residents are being asked to be cautious when dealing with any doorstep callers after a recent incident. People from utility companies asking to look at meters are not always in uniform but should always carry identification. If you are still not happy call the company to confirm who they are. If they are legitimate they should not mind. Always check their identification and if you suspect the caller is not genuine please call Police, using 999 if necessary.

Scam telephone calls... are being received by persons purporting to be from Microsoft wanting details of your computer so that they can take control and access your computer and all its personal information of the owner. Never believe someone telling you they know you have a problem with your computer that they can fix.

Cold Callers...Suffolk's Trading Standards team have recently introduced another No Cold Calling zone in Suffolk. The total number of NCCZs in Suffolk to date is 29. Zones are set up in areas where residents have identified they do not want visits from unsolicited or 'cold' callers. The zones are created in partnership with Trading Standards, the Police, Neighbourhood Watch and local residents. They are marked with signs in the street and stickers displayed in residents' windows asking people not to call at their doors.

A recent survey of residents living in the first 12 NCCZs in Suffolk found that 97% felt safer as a result. In the same survey, 93% said that doorstep visits from uninvited traders had virtually stopped since the introduction. A14 Bridges

There have been two local instances of people throwing stones or other objects from bridges onto cars travelling on the A14. Joint Housing Board for Babergh and Mid Suffolk


Tenants and leaseholders in Babergh and Mid Suffolk can stand for election to become part of a new Joint Housing Board, which will make decisions about issues affecting all tenants across the two districts. This is believed to be the first Joint Housing Board in the country where tenants and Members from two districts will work together, with equal voting rights, to decide on strategy and develop plans and policy. The Joint Housing Board, which will be made up of 12 Members (six councillors and six tenants), will be established in the next few months. It will cover six wards across the two districts.

All tenants can stand for election. Those who stand as a candidate will be asked to write a 'mini-manifesto'. All tenants will then take part in a postal ballot to elect a tenant to represent their ward in February 2012. 


Great Finborough and Buxhall Under 5's *Christmas Play*

Suffolk Better Broadband Programme

You may have noticed in the media that the Suffolk Better Broadband Programme is gathering pace, and Suffolk County Council hopes to start work on improving services with Suffolk in Autumn this year. Before we start work, we have to go through a public procurement process to select a provider to develop the Suffolk network.

In order to make this contract as attractive as possible to bidders, as well as to provide evidence to use as leverage during negotiations, we are asking households to register their demand for broadband. This will make our case as strong as possible. Not only will this aid the procurement process, but it will also inform us of where the areas of particular need exist across Suffolk.

The survey only takes a few minutes to complete, and can be found at <u>www.suffolk.gov.uk/broadband</u>. Ideally we want to get the message to all households in all parishes, that their input via this survey will be critical to improving broadband in Suffolk. Hard copies of the survey can be provided.
