

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


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News from the Parish Council

There have been two meetings since the last newsletter. At the Parish Council meeting on 9 December 2013, discussion and decisions included:

- Cllr Matthissen informed the Council that everyone is encouraged to seek pre application advice when contemplating submitting a planning application, and that there will be no boundary review by Stowmarket Town Council before 2015
- A resident made a plea to council for support in taking forward a project to provide a skate facility in the village because children aged 10-12 are frequently seen using scooters and boards in and around the car park suggesting that a ramp or other facility for skating was needed. It was suggested that support would be forthcoming from several parents and that the amenity land adjacent to Valley Lane would be an ideal location. The Council, with Cllr Matthissen's help agreed to explore the possibilities
- Concern was expressed regarding the surface dressing of the Valley Lane car park, which would be checked
- Complaints have been received regarding the amount of dog waste not being picked up on the footpath off Valley Lane adjacent to the allotments and around the allotment site. MSDC will be chased for their promised dog bin and be asked to move the existing under-used one at Pettiward Hall to the footpath. Signage will be put up and known offenders will be reported to the police to ensure prosecutions can be made
- All actions recommended by the playground annual inspection are in hand
- The replacement light for Church Road has been ordered and an action date is awaited
- The Allotment Association would like to erect a table off site to offer their surplus produce to the public for donations. It was agreed that this would be permissible within the Tenancy rules and regulations.
- It was resolved to have no objection in relation to erection of a single storey extension with a lean to roof, The Cart Lodge, Valley Lane

- The installation of an air source heat pump at Pettiward Hall has been granted by Mid Suffolk DC
- It was agreed that a work programme for the wildflower area would be tasked to the Forward Planning Working Group as their remit encompasses all of the amenity areas.

At the Parish Council meeting on 13 January 2014, discussion and decisions included:

- The budget and precept for 2014/2015 was reviewed in light of the final grant and tax base confirmation from MSDC. The budget was amended and approved and generated a precept requirement of £7,850. It was resolved to set the precept for 2014/115 at £7,850
- The possibility of providing a skate park in the village will be explored
- The surface dressing at the Valley Lane car park has been checked and nothing has been found that would prove a hazard to car tyres
- The dog bin adjacent to Pettiward Hall has been moved to the footpath off Valley Lane and a new bin has been added at the allotments/car park
- Action would be taken in an effort to stop dog fouling of our public areas
- Gipping Homes continues to hold up the signing of the transfer documents for the amenity land
- The Woodpecker Hill land transfer has been completed and it is confirmed that covenants within the transfer ensure specific use of the land therefore preventing any sale as domestic garden
- There has been no application for the vacant position of parish tree officer
- It was resolved to have no objection in relation to a change of use of agricultural buildings to commercial stables and associated facilities and change of use of land to mixed agriculture and commercial equine use and accommodation for overnight stay, Mill Hall Farm, High Road
- The installation of replacement double glazing to all windows at Pettiward Hall has been granted by Mid Suffolk DC

- The change of use application for East House has been withdrawn
- Due to the excessive costs associated with reinstating the edges of the rubber surfacing and replacement of the spinning pole and vertical wall on the children's play area, these would continue to be monitored. The existing spinning pole would be reduced in height and replaced
- The request to use the design on the newsletter to promote the events marking the centenary of the First World War was granted
- It was noted that further wooden posts may be needed on parts of Church Road green to prevent the creeping erosion by parking cars. It was agreed that some pruning of bushes would facilitate further spaces for parking. Action Cllr Vendittelli and Cllr Turner
- It was noted that the drains on High Road may be blocked causing standing water between the school and The Chestnuts. Photo evidence will be sought in order to ask SCC Highways to investigate.

The next Parish Council meeting is on Monday 10 March at 7.30pm in Pettiward Hall. You are welcome to attend. **Norman Vendittelli**

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Dog Poo

It is every dog owner's duty to clean up after his or her dog. It is no defence to claim ignorance of the dog's action. The problem of dog mess in the parish has been highlighted to the Parish Council on several occasions. Problems have been reported on footpaths throughout the parish and especially around the allotment site and children's play areas.



Dog mess is a nuisance at the very least, covering

shoes and clothes. At its worst, contact with canine excrement can lead to blindness due to the Toxocara canis worm carried by dogs. Roundworm eggs in dog mess can remain active in the soil for many years, long after the dog mess has weathered away. Young children are particularly at risk of getting Toxocariasis because they are more likely to put things into their mouths and less likely to wash their hands properly. This causes headache, stomach upsets, breathing difficulties, liver problems, epilepsy, blindness and death.

Dog owners <u>please</u> clean up after your dog in public places. If your dog fouls in a public place, you must clean up the mess under the Dog Act 1996. Always carry a poop scoop or a bag to carry the mess to a dog bin. There are several provided by the Parish Council around the village. If there isn't a dog mess bin on your route, take it home and dispose of it there. Failure to clean up after your dog can mean anything from the issue of a fixed penalty ticket of £50 to prosecution and a fine of up to £1,000.

If you see this offence happening <u>report it</u>. You can report dog fouling that isn't cleaned up to your local council on 0845 606 6067 or email <u>customerservices@csduk.com</u> If possible, give details such as the name and address of the offender or a good description of them and their dog. The arrangements to distribute new twin bin calendars together with the arrangements for Christmas were severely disrupted by a failure on the part of the company commissioned to distribute them. Budget 2014/15

The provisional budget was discussed at the Executive Meeting on 13 January. The headline figures are a 1.7% increase in Council Tax together with a small rise in council house rents. The District Council continues to receive substantial sums in New Homes Bonus which has now built up a reserve of £3.4 million which our political group is once again urging should be invested in the local economy in various ways. The council administration now says that they intend to spend a significant amount of this but have as yet provided no detail of when or on what items.

Chilton Leys Development Brief

This document has now been adopted, and planning applications, such as the current one for 210 homes near the A14, will be expected to conform. This is, however, subject to viability of the application (developer profit margin), which is currently a very big 'IF'. Not all the social infrastructure and benefits are likely to be provided with this first phase. To get in touch with me, see Who's Who.



Step out for St Elizabeth Hospice's Walk of Thoughts

Join St Elizabeth Hospice for a peaceful and reflective walk around Fynn Valley, Ipswich, to remember a loved one or to simply enjoy the countryside. The eighth annual Walk of Thoughts will take place on Sunday 16 March and walkers can take a three or five mile circular walk, starting from YM RUFC Rugby Club in Rushmere St Andrew. Beforehand, there will be an informal remembrance service at 10.15am, giving walkers, not just those touched by Hospice care, time to reflect and remember loved ones. Walkers will be invited to write the name of their loved one on a pebble provided by the Hospice, which they can keep. Participants will also receive a bookmark containing seeds which they can take home and plant in their loved one's memory.

The event attracts keen walkers, as well as those remembering loved ones, and participants are encouraged to raise sponsorship. If a walker raises £52 that could help fund a visit to a patient's home for an hour by our Hospice at Home nurses. All money raised goes towards enabling us to provide local Hospice care for local people. The walk is open to people of all ages and dogs on leads are welcome. The route is not suitable for wheelchairs or buggies. Walkers can register in advance or on the day from 9.30am, ready to set off for the walk at 10.30am. Registration fees are £12.50 in advance or £15 on the day, and it is free for under 16s. 5. And what about every house in the village lighting a candle that night and extinguishing it at 11pm? The time when Sir Edward Grey made the telling comment that `The lamps are going out all over Europe`.

The War memorials in our village have 12 names of local men who died between August 1914 and March 1919. What do we know about them? The War lasted 4 years and the people of Great Finborough were very heavily involved. What do any of us know of what went on? Perhaps it is time to find out and remember. **John Kendall**

News from St Andrew's Church

The first Sunday of February is known as Candlemas in the church. It is the day when we remember that Jesus, still a baby, was called the light for the nations. In pre-Christian times, it was also a festival of light marking the



mid-point of winter, half way between the winter solstice and the spring equinox. Some people lit candles to scare away evil spirits on the dark winter nights and now we celebrate the day the light of Christ came to us with candles in church.

People believed that Candlemas predicted the weather for the rest of the winter and there is an ancient rhyme that goes *If Candlemas Day be fair and bright, Winter will have another flight. If Candlemas Day brings cloud and rain, Winter will not come again.* I shall be watching out, as we have had an unusually mild winter this year compared with the last few. Is it over? Is Spring truly on the way? Today as I write some plants in our garden seem to think so.

I was very glad it wasn't raining or worse still snowy on 12 January when Rev'd Chris and I were licensed at Combs Church. My licence is now for Combs, Little Finborough, Great Finborough, Buxhall, Shelland, Harleston and Onehouse. I am sorry we were unable to announce it in the last newsletter being sworn to secrecy until the archdeacon gave us the OK at the end of November. That means that Chris Childs and I will be your priests in all of these seven villages and you will find contact details for me in Who's Who. We want to say thank you to all who supported the licensing service at Combs, despite the difficult parking arrangements there. It was good to see over 200 people there for us as we start this new phase of church ministry.

We need to thank you too for the great support you gave to the Crib Festival at the end of last year. We raised somewhere in the region of $\pounds 2,000$ for the church here in Great Finborough which will help us pay our way through 2014. It is very sweet and short. It stars Denzil the donkey and was

We have lots of plans which we hope you will also support to commemorate the outbreak of WW1, not that I wish us to glory in it. `Little Ernie' Lottery

The Pettiward Hall is a registered charity (called Great Finborough Village Hall No: 246643) managed by volunteers for the benefit of residents. To raise funds for the continued maintenance and improvement of the building and its facilities, the Management Committee is launching a 'Little Ernie' lottery scheme. We are asking residents to buy one lucky ticket per month for an annual payment of £12. If you want more chances to win, spent £24 or £36, or more.

The draw will take place on the 1st of each month, starting on 1 April. 50% of the income will be given back in prizes with two prizes per month of equal value. This means that, if 100 x £12 is paid in by 1 April, of the total £1,200 received, £600 goes to Hall funds. The remaining £600 will be paid in prize money so there will be 2 winners a month every month who each win £25. If more than 100 tickets are sold the prize money will be more than £25 for the same £12 stake.

The lottery has been registered with Mid Suffolk District Council and is open to anyone aged 16 or over except Pettiward Hall Management committee members or officers. Prize winners will be paid as soon as possible after the draw and details will be published in the newsletter.

It would not have been a WI Christmas Party without the addition of the 'hand bell ringers' and a singing of Christmas Carols. This year proved to be slightly different in that one of our members was elected to 'have a go' at ringing of the bells herself. She was brilliant of course! In December, we received the sad news that our President, Rosemary Bennett, had lost her fight for life. Our thoughts go to her family and may she Rest in Peace. At our first meeting of 2014 members were captivated by our speaker, Amanda Richmond. In 2009 Amanda, along with several other colleagues, and with six years of training behind her, set out on an expedition to climb Everest. At 8,850 metres above sea level this was no mean feat. With Everest claiming the life of at least one climber per year, she spoke of the wonderful Sherpas who were responsible for the safety of each individual climber on a 1:1 basis. A large percentage of climbers that meet their death on Everest are Sherpas. This being a very difficult and dangerous climb they are paid amply, providing them with a good lifestyle and standard of living.

The talk provided many humorous moments, with Amanda enlightening us on the difficulties of managing bodily functions there! Her photographs illustrated both the beauty of the summits but also how, within the blink of an eye, the weather can turn and become extremely dangerous. Temperatures plummet and are able to freeze you solid. Amanda pointed out that the sun is dangerous for climbers because the thawing effect causes avalanches and treacherous conditions underfoot. She sent out 500 letters asking for sponsorship and, in all, £10,000 was raised for The British Heart Foundation. A brilliant talk ending up with Amanda's advice on life: 'Live your Dream'!

Throughout the year, Healthwatch Suffolk has ensured that people have real opportunities to shape care services. It made a number of service improvements on the basis of local feedback including changes to plans for new services for stroke patients in Suffolk and the running of the Norfolk and Suffolk Foundation Trust mental health crisis support telephone line.

Looking forward, this year is shaping up to be equally as busy and will see the setup of Healthwatch Suffolk Hubs. They are intended to be local focal points where people can make their views heard and will mirror the county's district boundaries. The Hubs will enable and empower local people to play an active role in the design and delivery of their local services. They will bring together local people so that we can obtain their views about the health and social care services that they use.

News from the Primary School

I hope you all had a happy and relaxing Christmas and New Year. I am pleased to confirm that Melony Mayhew has been elected as a Parent Governor. Elections are to be held for another Parent Governor. The Governors and the staff are very excited at the busy year ahead of us as we prepare for our first ever Year 5 children. The recruitment of new members of staff is underway.

Our Christmas show which was held at the Salvation Army building in Stowmarket was a great success, I was very proud of all the children for their success with this year's Christmas performances of 'There Is Something Amazing Going On', thanks to them, their parents and all the staff who worked so hard on it. We raised \pounds 430.35 towards the work of the Salvation Army in whose building we performed. The children also benefit greatly from the regular parent helpers who come in to support with reading, classroom and administrative jobs. We really appreciate their input.

This term has got off to a flying start with children working hard towards their individual learning targets. In Blue Class 'Target homework' introduced last term has been a big success so far, with children who have not quite understood, or needed a little more practise with a particular skill clearly moving forward following their instant homework. Many parents have worked with their child, adding to the homework to encourage further consolidation and the children have been pleased to bring in their completed work, clearly proud of their achievement. Year 3 and some Year 4 children are swimming each Tuesday while Year 2 children are learning to play hockey. I am pleased to report that the school football team continue to do well.

In Red Class the topic for this half term is 'Alive!' We have started our History work by finding out about dinosaurs and other animals that are now extinct. The children very much enjoyed visiting our class 'Dinosaur Museum' and 'Dinosaur Dig'. They have been busy digging up artefacts, weighing them, measuring them and recording their findings. They have also been finding out lots of information from our museum, and non-fiction books. We have already discovered that we have a few dinosaur experts in the class!

In Green Class number recognition, ordering and counting with numbers to 20 and beyond is a main focus this half term. We will start to make sensible estimates and children will also spend lots of time practising how to find 'one more' and 'one less'. Through practical activities, children will begin to learn how to add and subtract. We will also be exploring measuring using non-standard measures and looking at measuring time. We will also be consolidating their previous knowledge on shape and patterns.

This half term gymnastics will be the focus of our PE lessons. We will be developing skills in body shape using stretching and curling. Children will be encouraged to make narrow and wide shapes using different parts of their body to take their weight. Children will use these shapes in movement using floor apparatus. We will be using the hall for their PE lessons and learning how to use this space safely. Finger Gym activities will continue to be used to develop fine motor skills needed for holding a pencil and cutting with scissors. The importance of turn taking, sharing, listening, considering others' feelings and following our School Rules will always be emphasised in Green Class. Children will also be thinking in particular about how to keep safe.

In Purple Class we have a busy term ahead and are already underway with our new topic: "A day without laughter is a day wasted." You may recognise this as a Charlie Chaplin quote, it is also the title of our Celebration of Schools Music Production. The big event this term will be our appearance on stage in the concert hall at Snape Maltings. This will take place in early March, the preparation for which will dominate our curriculum this term. Mrs Moye & Mrs Hartley are continuing to run the School Choir Club this term.

As Historians we will be looking at our own family trees and that of Charlie Chaplin to establish his link to Great Finborough. We will investigate life in the village at the time when Charlie Chaplin's great grandparents lived here. In geography we will be mapping out our village as it is in the present day and again how it looked historically in the 1700s. We will use local maps, grid referencing and digital mapping using Google maps. As mathematicians we will be focusing on money and the children will have the opportunity to be involved in choosing and costing out equipment for their new classrooms. We will also be looking at measure, telling the time, fractions and the number system. We will still be having weekly maths tests, though this half term we will focus on other areas of mental maths, beginning with addition. Next half term, we will return our focus to our times tables.



As artists we will be looking at using a variety of medium to create images of Charlie Chaplin, we will experiment with pencils, charcoals and paints. Later in the term we will be turning our hand to some textile work.

All the children start back at school after half term on Monday 24 February. **Stephen Dodd**

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Staying warm and healthy over winter

GPs are encouraging people to stay healthy and warm over the winter months. We are all likely to feel the cold during the winter months. It is important to stay aware of the fact that cold weather can cause serious illness such as stroke, heart attacks and pneumonia and can even kill, especially if you have a long term health condition or are over 65. We can't change the weather but we can all make sure we are prepared and ready to deal with a potentially harsh Suffolk winter.

<u>Get a flu jab</u> - You should have already had your flu jab by now. Everyone aged 65 or over, younger people with certain medical conditions and pregnant women are entitled to a free flu vaccination. For the first time this year children aged two and three on 1 September 2013 are eligible for flu protection to help prevent the spread of flu to their brothers and sisters and their parents. Talk to your GP surgery.

<u>Be prepared</u> – Making sure you stock up on some essentials that can help you and your family cope with common conditions such as colds, coughs, stomach upsets, flu and earache, will mean that you are better prepared. Your medicine cabinet should include Paracetamol, antidiarrhoeal medicine, rehydration mixture, indigestion remedy and plasters. You should also keep a stock of tinned and non-perishable food items that you can use should the weather conditions prevent you from getting out and about.

<u>Wash your hands</u> – simple advice but by washing your hands regularly you could prevent catching or spreading a cold or norovirus, the winter vomiting bug. Make sure your children get into the habit of regular hand washing and always wash your hands after using the loo and before cooking and eating.

<u>Look out for others</u> – remember to keep an eye out for elderly relatives, neighbours and friends. The winter weather means many people are unable to get out and about, so spare a few moments if you can to pop round for a chat.

<u>Keep your home warm</u> – your main living room should be between around 18-21°C (65-70°F). You could also use a hot water bottle or an electric blanket (but not both at the same time) to keep you warm while you're in bed. <u>Keep active and eat well</u> - move around at least once every hour and don't sit down for long periods of time. Try to have hot meals and warm drinks regularly throughout the day. Food is a vital source of energy and will help to keep your body warm.

<u>*Wrap up well*</u> - wrap up well when you go out in the cold. Wear lots of thin layers. Clothes made from cotton, wool and fleecy fibres are particularly good and help to maintain body heat.

<u>Know what to do should you need help</u> – remember that NHS 111 is a free 24/7 medical advice line. Trained advisors will be able to give you advice on a health condition affecting you or your family.

What's been happening in and around the area...

Over the last couple of months there have been few crimes to report, and I trust everyone enjoyed the festive season. During the day of 19 December entry was gained to a dwelling within the village by smashing a downstairs window at the front, and a significant amount of damage was caused within. Investigations are ongoing.

Heating oil thefts are starting to appear again and a number of sheds were broken into in Ringshall at the beginning of January. Between 10 and 13 January, a New Holland large tractor was stolen from a farmyard in Buxhall after detaching it from a ploughing unit.

Free Catalytic Converter marking sessions

The first event took place at Taylor Commercial Ltd, Haughley, and we had a great response. The last session in the current batch will be on 1 February at Truck East, Violet Hill Road IP14 1NN from 10am to 1pm. We are grateful to both companies for their community spirit in offering their facilities free of charge. This is a great example of police and local businesses working together to reduce crime for local people.

Microchipping Dogs

Microchipping will soon be compulsory for all dogs in England. 'Paws on Patrol' is a scheme being launched this Spring and is a free to join initiative to promote and reward responsible community members and responsible dog owners. Being a member you will be entitled to receive discounts and other offers from



supporting dog related businesses. You will receive a membership card once you simply provide your vet stamped application to say your dog is microchipped and vaccinated. This is a partnership venture between Suffolk Police and MSDC & Babergh Councils. You are not expected to challenge anyone or tackle any issue. Just report issues you encounter; from blocked rights of way to suspicious activity.

Some animal charities including the Dogs Trust, Blue Cross and Battersea Dogs and Cats home, currently offer a free microchipping service to owners. The procedure costs $\pounds 20-\pounds 30$ at private vets. The chip released through a needle between the dog's shoulder blades is the size of a grain of rice.
