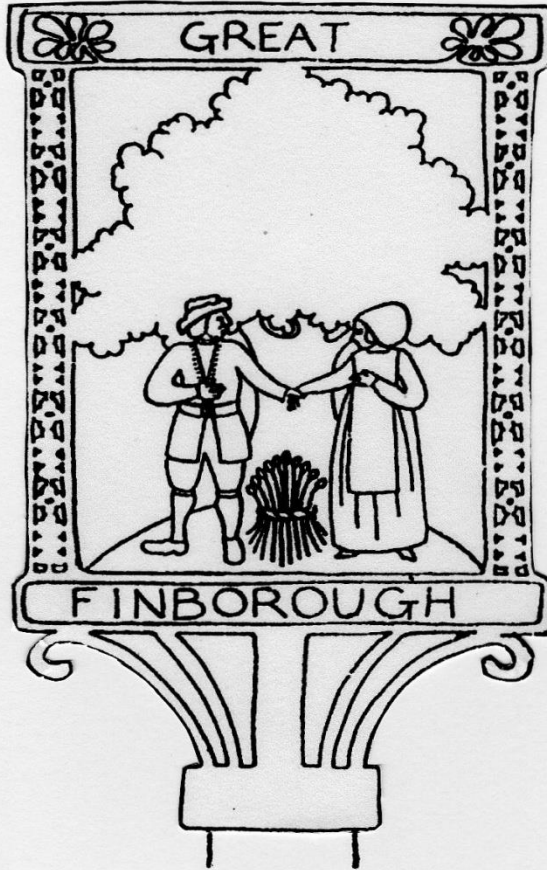

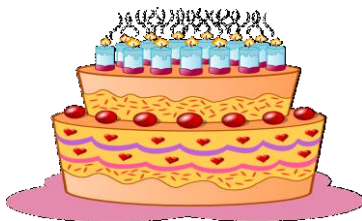

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## **From Onehouse Rectory**

On the last day of May, in half term week, we began a small adventure in Onehouse. We began to make a Santon. We were led by Peta Whiting who has her own Pottery locally and is well known in her field. She provided the plaster moulds, clay and all that we needed. During the morning we made nearly 100 items including numerous small figures and larger things such as a bridge, house and stable.

Well – I am sure the question you would like to ask is – What is a Santon? If you google santons you will find pictures and explanations; in simple terms it is a crib scene from the Provencal region of France. It is thought that the idea dates back to the French Revolution. Despite religious items being forbidden at that time, each village and home wanted a nativity scene at Christmas and the tradition grew up of making small figures and setting the whole scene in the mountain villages. Often there would be a Santonniere in the village who kept the moulds and oversaw the crib each year.

The figures in the scene are generally common to all Santons. As well as the obvious – Mary, Joseph, baby Jesus, the Kings and some animals, there are all the members of the village and each character has a story. Some bring problems such as Simon the blind man led by his son, who has his sight restored when his tears fall on the face of baby Jesus. There is an old couple who bring a plea that they might both die on the same day. Some are sinners such as the fishmonger who confesses her scales are fixed and the woman who beats her donkey and who is told to walk home leading it patiently. Many bring gifts such as fish, bread and firewood and some are given unexpected gifts such as the miller whose mill broke down.

The figures are very delicate. Although ours will be fired, the older tradition was not to fire them, such that in the past, each year the figures needed to be checked and often repaired and renewed. In the tradition of the Santons, this symbolizes our own frailty and regular need of care and attention if we are to be able to function fully and to God's glory in this beautiful world in which we live.

As each person in the crib scene approaches the baby Jesus – gifts, joys, sorrows, repentance and foolishness all gather around the manger. Very much like us, these figures represent the various aspects of each of our characters and symbolically we bring the good and the bad and together offer them to Christ. As is the life in any

village and not just at Christmas, we find joy and sadness, we find sickness and health, we find birth and death: and we are able to offer ourselves and all that we are as a community in order to receive the healing touch of Christ.

We plan to meet again at the start and end of the summer holidays to make some more clay figures, to paint the ones already made and eventually the scene will be displayed at the Grundisburgh Crib Fair in November before coming back to Onehouse. **Reverend Rachel**

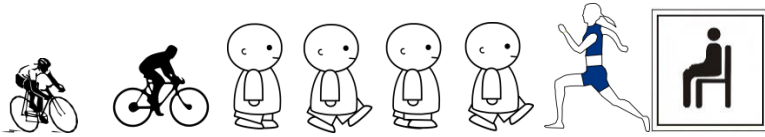

## News from your District Councillor - John Matthissen

### Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment (SHLAA)

The District Council has announced the *draft* outcome of a SHLAA following a “call for sites” for land - 2 hectares or more to be brought forward. You can read about it <http://www.midsuffolk.gov.uk/planning-and-building/planning-policy/local-development-framework/strategic-housing-land-availability-assessment-2016/> with the map of the area around Stowmarket on page 214. The numbering of the sites is completely arbitrary; it does NOT suggest one site is preferable to another etc. This assessment is to inform the new Local Plan ahead of an allocations process. This does not however preclude any landowner from submitting a planning application.

### Five Year housing land supply.

The vexed question of the lack of 5 year supply in Mid Suffolk has been pressed harder with a successful motion at the MSDC Executive Committee. During the debate regarding a joint (with Babergh) Local Plan Cllr Andrew Stringer moved an amendment which read: *'That a clear strategy be urgently brought forward to help deal with the current lack of a five year land supply* This motion will not in itself cure the problem, and Mid Suffolk are still being less than clear about their response. Given that we are now likely to have a 3.7 year supply, upcoming government assessments will push up our housing target numbers by at least 20%. Mid Suffolk DC has announced a “sustainable growth” initiative to persuade communities that our patch needs at least 20,000 new homes!

**Activ Sheds and Active Lives** I was struck by this interesting initiative in Ipswich, sponsored by the Borough Council and East of England Co-op. They are inviting men with time on their hands to get involved in the People's Community Garden on allotment land. ## **NHS information.**

### **High pollen count - hay fever advice**

The Met Office is predicting a high pollen count over the coming week, which could mean a miserable time for those affected by hay fever. It is estimated that over 10 million people in the country suffer from hay fever and it affects people of all ages. Local GPs are reminding people of the action they can take to reduce their exposure to pollen and what can be done to control hay fever symptoms. Dr Mark Shenton, a GP in Stowmarket and chairman of NHS Ipswich and East Suffolk Clinical Commissioning Group said: "We all like to get out and about when the weather's good although for some the burden of hay fever can make everyday life tough, affecting social plans and emotional wellbeing. Thankfully there are things you can do to help yourself. "The best way to control hay fever is with antihistamines. Antihistamines can be purchased over the counter from your pharmacy without a prescription and should be taken as soon as possible to get into your system. If you've got any questions or concerns about using antihistamines the pharmacist will happily advise you. "Dr Christopher Browning, a GP in Long Melford and chairman of NHS West Suffolk Clinical Commissioning Group said: "Try to avoid grassy areas at certain times of day when pollen counts are highest, such as in the early morning, evening and at night. Wear wraparound sunglasses to stop the pollen getting into your eyes when you're outdoors. "Change clothes when returning home from a day out as pollen can cling to hair and clothing. Try to avoid drying clothes outside as it will help prevent bringing pollen into your house. A bath before bed can help to avoid pollen transferring to bed sheets. "Vacuuming regularly and dusting with a wet cloth can help to collect the dust and stop any pollen from being spread around, especially if you have pets in the house. "And don't forget that alcohol worsens hay fever. Beer and wine contain histamine, the chemical which sets off allergy symptoms in the body. "If you are still struggling with persistent symptoms make an appointment with your GP. Help your GP by listing the symptoms, when they happen, how often they occur and if anything specific seems to trigger them. Your GP may then offer tests to identify the allergen that is causing the symptoms.

### **Great Finborough Church Primary School** **Coast 2 Coast Cycle Ride 2016 (Year 6)**

Education at Great Finborough Primary goes beyond the classroom. As a school we are committed to providing our pupils with an enriched curriculum which includes access to a wide range of residential experiences and opportunities. This academic year I decided to offer our Year 6 children (10 and 11 Year olds) a very special opportunity over the May half-term holiday. I invited our Year 6 pupils to train for and complete the Sustrans Coast 2 Coast cycle ride from Whitehaven to Sunderland via the Lake District and the North Pennines (Approx. 140 miles). 15 of our Year 6 pupils accepted the challenge and training officially started in the Spring Term. The training consisted initially of 8 mile cycle rides around the Sudbury area and gradually built up to 24 mile routes around Suffolk, something the children (and

adults) were completing in just 3 hours. For the next stage of our training we headed up to the Peak District as an introduction to the hills! Again the routes ranged from 15 to 30 miles. Finally, we held two consecutive weekends in the North Pennines (Cumbria, Northumberland and County Durham). These weekends consisted of consecutive days of cycling distances up to 25 miles. Built into these weekends during our rest periods, we also enjoyed swimming, argo-cat rides, a disused mine exploration with a qualified instructor, laser quest and bowling. With the training completed, it was finally time for the project! We left school on the Friday before half-term and travelled by minibus to our accommodation which was located just above the beautiful village of Garrigill. The first evening involved a final briefing session on the route before settling down for the night.

Day 1 (25 miles): We started in Whitehaven on the west coast with our back wheels dipped in the sea before heading East out of Whitehaven towards the Whinlatter Forest Visitors Centre. The weather was kind to us and our progress was good. During the evening we enjoyed a swimming session at a local pool before settling down on the sofas to hear all the messages the parents had sent the children by text to my phone or through our online photo and message sharing site.

Day 2 (18.5 miles): From Whinlatter Forest we headed towards Keswick before ending our day near to the village of Troutbeck. Again the weather was good but this part of the journey truly highlighted the challenges this part of the Lake District experienced due to flooding last December as part of the route has been washed away and a diversion was in place. Another relaxing swim and our nightly message sharing session enabled us all to relax and reflect on the progress being made.

Day 3 (23.25 miles): Troutbeck to Renwick was a long day but in good weather. We met some sixth form pupils from a school in the south of England who were very impressed at the progress and achievements of our pupils. The evening once again

consisted of message sharing and a lot of laughs at some of the comments the parents had made to the photos on our share site. Day 4 (14.5 miles): Renwick to Nenthead. This day was a real challenge, the weather was bright but the wind speed as we took on the difficult climb to the top of Hartside was up to 54 mph, making it almost impossible to stay on our bikes. However, we conquered the massive climb and cycled enthusiastically to the top! The long downhill of just over 3 miles is usually a pleasure but due to the wind speed we still had to pedal all the way in to a head wind. Following a few other significant up hills, we made it to the village of Nenthead for a well-deserved play in the park and moral boosting chocolate stop. Despite a challenging day, the children still found the energy to enjoy playing outside and exploring the local area.

Day 5 (20 miles): Nenthead to Parkhead (Just above the small town of Rookhope). This was our most challenging day and tested the whole team to the limit. The day consisted of strong winds, followed by rain and to finish off... dense fog! This was all thrown at us as we cycled over the highest part of the route, the steepest hills to cycle up and with us passing the 100 mile milestone. Every child continued with utter determination throughout- I was extremely proud of them all. A well-deserved swim was in order at the end of day 5 and lots of praise from parents re the photos we had uploaded earlier in the evening which really did show the challenges of the day.

Day 6 (26 miles): Parkhead to Washington. The weather was improving and the going finally got easier. It was a long day but mainly downhill and we soon reached our destination. Our final swim and photo evening was a great opportunity to reflect on the challenge we were so close to finishing.

Day 7 (10 miles): Washington to Roker Pier Sunderland. We started our final day with the issuing of our Coast 2 Coast t-shirts. We quickly covered the distance required and were soon just yards from the finish line. As we turned the final corner, we were greeted by not only our support team but a group of



parents who had travelled up from Suffolk. We all felt a huge sense of pride and achievement as we cycled through the cheering crowds and dipped our front wheel into the sea. Challenge completed by all team members!

We returned to our accommodation in our minibus adorned with balloons and banners, packed our bags and headed up to the Hartside Cafe for one final celebration meal before heading back to Suffolk. Once back at school we were greeted by crowds of parents who cheered us in to the playground with the minibus CD player pumping out 'we are the champions', fireworks were launched and a bottle or two of non-alcoholic fizz was opened!

The success of this project was down to a real team effort. As a team of cyclists we needed to look after, respect and encourage each other to ensure that we all (adults and children) were able to complete the challenge. As a cycling team, we needed the support of the cycle maintenance crew, support vehicles and the catering team. We needed to know that our parents, staff and other members of the community were following our progress and supporting us from home. With everyone pulling together, the challenge was possible.

To complete a challenge of this nature and magnitude takes determination, resilience, commitment and teamwork, all of which are important life-skills. To complete a challenge of this nature and magnitude when you're 10 and 11 years old takes all of the above and more! I am immensely proud of my Year 6 pupils and their achievements, a truly amazing group of children.

Yes, the main purpose of the children's visit is for Health Recuperation but how brilliant is it that we can also give them memories to take home that will last them a lifetime!

It is very unlikely that any of the children who come in the group will ever leave Belarus again let alone come back to England. Occasionally a child is fortunate enough to receive an invitation for a Private Visit but with the increasing costs of air fares and visas we are seeing the number of these invitations becoming less each year.

The day after the children arrive we hold a "Clothing Party" for them, this is a very important event for the children as having arrived with only the clothes they are wearing they will be able to choose clothing for themselves and any siblings at home. The children do not mind that the clothing is second hand, it is amazing to see the look on their faces when they see all the clothes on display and know that they can choose whatever they want from what is available.

As this is an ongoing program we are always happy to continue to receive donations of clothing for the children throughout the year, any age is appreciate as we not only provide clothing to the children when they come here but also to their brothers and sisters at home. We currently support families in Belarus with children age from birth to 17 years of age. We are always grateful for your support and hope it may continue long into the future.

### **From Chief Inspector Matthew Rose to you all.**

Almost 10,000 vehicles were recorded by our Community Speed Watch volunteers in 2015, whilst it is disappointing that so many drivers have chosen to exceed the limit in our communities; the figures demonstrate the hard work and time that Community Speed Watch volunteers have given to making our roads safer.

**As the majority of our "speeders" are local, the fact that out of all those written to, less than 4% have been recorded again; demonstrates the effectiveness of the initiative.**

One of my favourite aspects of my role is frequently receiving letters of apology from people have been recorded speeding by CSW. I have had the awful task of informing someone that their loved one has been killed on the road, so my view is that even one fewer person speeding could mean a life saved on our roads and the prevention of the devastating effects on everyone involved.

I would like to thank you for your continued commitment to your community and assure you that you really are making a difference'.

### **Speed Enforcement Officer**

Those of you who were able to attend one of our Annual Meetings are already aware that a Police Staffed civilian Speed Enforcement Officer (SEO), Chris Fiske, has been employed and accredited by the Chief Constable to carry out speed enforcement checks in Suffolk. He is expected to be joined by another SEO in the near future.

He operates a Police style speed device on a tri-pod, wears a Hi Vis jacket with 'Police Staff' on the back and puts signs either side of where he is operating which State 'Safety Camera Enforcement' showing a camera.

His role is to attend areas where high vehicle speeds have been noted. To gain this information he has access to our Community Speed Watch data base to identify those areas.

He will attend CSW and other sites in order to carry out his enforcement which means that the driver of any vehicle he monitors in excess of the limit will receive a fine and endorsement on their drivers licence. **As usual the Community Safety Team wish to thank you for your continued hard work and support**
