Great Finborough Parish Council

Our scheduled July meeting dealt with the usual subjects including approval of various expenditure, together with discussion around the Councils responsibilities for Auto Enrolment Pensions and Councils regret that the Listing of the shop as a Community Asset had been overturned on appeal.

An application for a grant from Battisford & District Cricket Club was considered and it was acknowledged that the club hosted the Primary School sports day and several children and adults from the village used the facilities regularly, therefore it was agreed that a donation of £50 be awarded to the club.

Valley Lane Recreational Area- The results of the public consultation regarding Valley Lane facilities were discussed at length – Only 24 completed questionnaires have been received which is a very disappointing response considering the implications to this valuable community asset. The initial commitment from the Primary School was only backed up with 8 replies from satchel post. With this result from residents it will be almost impossible to source external funding for even the smallest of schemes.

The responses that were received highlighted a wish for some sort of improvement or replacement of the football pitch with an all weather surface and lowering of levels or fencing. It was resolved that due to a lack of positive support from the consultation process and no remit to spend time and money on improving this sports facility there will be no project to replace the football pitch at this time.

Other suggestions to come from analysis of the responses were improved picnic areas and an enhanced family area. It was agreed that improvements could be made to the weed control and grass surfacing with consideration of additional picnic benches and football nets taken at the next meeting.

Community Speed Watch – With the equipment now ready for use sessions have commenced. The high numbers of excess speeds

recorded in the few sessions carried out have already confirmed that this community scheme is an essential tool in the drive to improve safety through the village.

A huge thank you goes to those people who have given their time to get this scheme up and running again. We are always keen to get more volunteers on the rota so if you think you can spare the odd hour occasionally please contact ClIr Simon Tarabella or myself for details of how to get involved.

Planning - With no meeting planned for August a short additional special meeting had to be called at the end of July to consider a planning application that had a response deadline well before our September meeting. With no representation from members of the public it was resolved to submit a No Objection comment to the application for the Erection of a new front porch at Aldecott, Valley Lane.

Our next scheduled meeting will be on Monday 12 September at Pettiward Hall, please come along if you have any comments, suggestions or questions, councillors would be pleased to see you.

From the Rectory

September always feels to me like another start to the year. For those engaged in education it certainly is and as meetings and events pick up again after the summer break we can be forgiven for thinking – here we go again. No sign of Christmas in the shops as I write but Harvest Festivals, Christmas planning, darker nights and the endless cycle of meetings are here again. For many it is the long run without break to the end of the year and many hate the darker nights. What happened to the Trafalgar and St Edmund Bank Holiday suggestions?

But into the ever circling year comes the New with the potential for transformation. We are doing very well at the Olympics which is giving our international standing a great boost at a time when many feel Brexit has signalled isolationist/retro tendencies. The Olympics mirror our traditional sense of fair play. Our democracy can still allow the real concerns of people to speak over the political parties with the Brexit vote. The Olympic boost will perhaps give us new vigour on the world stage as we renegotiate our international relationships and locally think how we relate to those different to us and vice versa. Transformation indeed.

Again Buxhall and Shelland's Fete was a wonderful success, the scaffolding is down at Gt Finborough and the Faculty granted for their new facilities , Combs Roof repair is about to start and their Bell Fund is being relaunched to provide 8 (4 more) for that wonderful tower. Perhaps they can be ringing to celebrate the Centenary of the end of WW1? Baptisms are nearly weekly now.....we have 8 to be Confirmed in their faith.

Then, on the other hand the darkness of the terrorist atrocities in Continental Europe mirrored by those in Asia, are closer to us now, literally and emotionally. What is it, we wonder, that drives the terrorism of Isis and others? On the Sunday nearest their deaths, Buxhall has commemorated each of the soldiers from that parish killed in the First World War. It has been poignant. The reasons for war and terrorism are complex but perhaps it is something to do with that most basic human instinct – greed which seems to make some feel they are entitled to more than others – or even to take their lives. Injustice, greed, cheating and selfishness are probably in our DNA but....

Harvest Festivals call us to remember that what we have is loaned by God. It may have been inherited, it may have been by the sweat of our brow because of our God given abilities, but ultimately we all die. Will we be remembered as a people who were generous with what we have, acknowledging it's not really ours, looking forward with hope and an open hand – or as a people who meanly defended that which we have because it is Ours? That is not the way of Christ – that is not the way to lead a life that is full of richness and contentment.

So the years ever circle and we all circle with them, might we take this new beginning to engage with the good and positive that we can see all around us? Might we contribute our money, time or talent to that which is good fair and LIFE giving? All good wishes **Rev Chris**

Recognising the Symptoms of a Stroke

A Stroke is a medical emergency; the sooner you get help and seek medical attention will help improve your chances of a good recovery. Our brain requires oxygen and other essential nutrients to function, if the blood supply is blocked or there is a bleed in the brain this will cause a Stroke.Depending on where the blockage or bleed takes place, depends on the type of symptoms that can be experienced. Some people may experience a Transient Ischaemic attack, often called a TIA, the symptoms are the same but the blockage is temporary and so are the symptoms, leading to full recovery, often within minutes or hours, but always within 24 hours. This is often called a mini stroke and is a warning that you are at risk of having a Stroke. Both require a rapid response and you should always call 999 immediately, even if your symptoms disappear after a few minutes or a few hours, you still require a medical assessment and treatment to reduce your risk of having a Stroke.

How to recognise the signs and symptoms of a Stroke – If you remember the word FAST, this will help you to remember.

- Facial Weakness can you smile, has your face fallen on one side?
- Arm Weakness Can you raise both arms and keep them there?
- **S**peech problems Can you speak clearly and be understood? Is your speech slurred?
- Time to call **999** If you, a friend or family member experience any **ONE** of these symptoms, get help immediately by calling **999**.


