You will have seen in the September newsletter that the Parish Council now has a full complement of councillors which is great news. Every month our clerk, Paula provides notes on the most recent meeting to keep villagers abreast of discussions held and decisions made on our behalf. The Parish Council plays an important role in the administration and governance of our village. Despite these meetings being where decisions are made on matters that affect us all (e.g. how the budget is spent, planning applications, speed watch, maintenance of community areas, etc) attendance of the public is notoriously poor. The Parish Council would welcome villagers showing an interest so do pop along to the meetings if you can to support them and make your views known, after all, they are there to make decisions for the benefit of our village so it is important they understand the views of villagers.

There are lots of events planned in October and November including the first Veterans Lunch, a visit to The Place for Plants and the village maintenance day. The more volunteers the easier for all so if you have a few hours to spare do come along and help to keep Great Finborough a village we are all proud to call home.

Unfortunately I have not received any recipes to include this month. If you have one to share or anything else you wish to contribute to the next newsletter please make sure this is sent to me by 15 October.

Finally, I would like to send a warm welcome to Kirsty and Matthew who have recently moved from Billericay to live near the church. If you see them around the village please say hello.

Great Finborough Parish Council

The September parish council meeting brought an extensive agenda and lots of public comments.

Public Forum - Residents in Borough Lane expressed concerns about the safety of pedestrians using the lane, the speed of vehicles and the lack of an accessible verge for pedestrians to step away from the road to avoid passing traffic has serious safety issues. Unfortunately the help available to designate a Quiet Lane has now finished and although it is still possible to get this designation SCC have confirmed they do not have a process or costings at this time. If you are driving on Borough Lane please slow your speed and be aware that pedestrians could be just around the blind bend with nowhere to get off the road. Hopefully SCC Highways engineers will assess the safety issues and authorise additional signage and verge cutting to help improve safety for users of Borough Lane going forward.

Antisocial Behaviour - A major concern is the substance abuse litter found at Valley Lane car park, the local PCSO has been informed and consideration of the provision of CCTV will now be taken to monitor anti-social behaviour in the village.

Finance - Finance and governance takes up a lot of the September agenda, once the monthly reports and approvals for spending have been dealt with the completion of the External Audit, with no matters for concern, was noted and the conclusion of the audit advertised in accordance with regulations.

A review of the asset register and approval of the insurance renewal is dealt with together with the annual review of Standing Orders, policies and procedures and the approval of the internal control statement. The effectiveness of the councils governing arrangements and systems of internal control is carried out and this year all controls in place were felt to be effective and no areas for development were identified. I am pleased to report that residents can be confident that their council and their money are being governed effectively in line with regulations.

Woodpecker Hill Wood - Council approved the purchase of some English bluebells to be planted at Woodpecker Hill wood and the volunteer group who look after the wood for everyone's enjoyment were commended for their commitment to this valuable asset for the village. If you haven't spent time there lately please do go and take a walk around.

Village Maintenance – There are lots of small things that can make a big difference to the way the village looks. Our District and County councils unfortunately put most of these at the bottom of their list of priorities so even when we report them it's unlikely that they will be addressed anytime soon, if ever, so the parish council have agreed that a volunteer working group be set up to tackle some of these ourselves. The first working group is fixed for Saturday, 21 October meeting at 9am in the car park. Cllrs will draft a schedule of work to include cleaning signage, cutting back vegetation and general village maintenance. If you can come along and help please do.

Speedwatch – Cllr Ant Mann has confirmed that he now has a list of enough volunteers to re-start the rota for Speedwatch. Training will now be arranged and hopefully this valuable initiative will help slow down traffic along High Road.

Planning - Remember that residents can make comments on applications that affect them and their community. The first step is to review the application on the Mid Suffolk District Council website or at their offices. The Parish Council agendas list application numbers with their address and proposal details which are open for comment, the time scale for comment is short so make sure that you submit your comments before the deadlines if you want them to be considered. The guickest and easiest way to view or comment on an application is to use the planning application online facility on the District Councils website: https://www.midsuffolk.gov.uk/planning/application-search and-comment

Please remember that your comments will be made available to the public and can be seen by everyone, so make sure your response is relevant and not defamatory or offensive. If you do not provide your name and address your comments will be treated as anonymous and your views will not be taken into account and your time wasted.

Solar farms

The appeal against MSDC planning refusal for a Solar Farm at Somersham was successful as well as the appeal for costs. There are currently several other applications for large solar farms in the district and this appeal decision will be an important material consideration. The appeal inspectors are reflecting strong policy direction from Government, such that loss of good agricultural land and impact on the landscape will often be outweighed by the need for non-fossil fuel electricity in the public interest.

Recycling and Repairing

The Eco futures stall continues to attract more and more of the 'hard to recycle' items such as toothbrushes, toothpaste tubes, pens, coffee pods and tetra-paks (juice cartons). This is mainly in conjunction with *Terracycle* with support from Mid Suffolk District Council.

Ride and Stride / Pedal and Drive

In 1973 a group of friends (widely believed to have originated in Great Finborough) got together to form the Suffolk Historic Churches Trust. Their aim, to raise money to preserve the fabric of these magnificent buildings in our county. This year is the Trust's 50th anniversary and during that time some $\pounds 10$ million, in today's money, has been raised. One of the many ways of fundraising is the annual Ride and Stride, where members of the communities across Suffolk elect to walk, ride a bicycle or horse and visit as many churches as is reasonably possible, collecting money through sponsorship.

Pedal and Drive was introduced five years ago, adding Vintage and Classic cars to the mix. Some 100 cars are set off from five of Suffolk's stately homes, each given a route that included visiting several churches and all converging on the cricket ground in Lavenham. Great Finborough was represented in all categories, with walkers, cyclists, vintage and classic car owners and half a dozen die hard runners. The latter completing a 14 mile course in the unseasonable heatwave on 9 September, thankfully rehydration took place at the Chestnut Horse. In Lavenham six bottles of Champagne were up for grabs for the winners in various classes - three of those were presented to the 'Finborough team! (Stephen & Ann Basey Fisher, Gerry Cobbolt and my Good Lady, Tracy Barnett). Once again, for a charitable cause, our village produced a 'Magna' effort. Well done to all those that took part.



Great Finborough Garden Club

At last we have had some very welcome rain to revive our gardens and prolong the flowers and harvest.

The AGM and social get together was held on the 14 September and was an opportunity to reflect on the past year, look ahead to the coming year and to enjoy a social get together over delicious home cooked cakes and savouries. Always an important part of garden club events!

The meeting was well attended, and the members voted to re-elect the current chair and committee. The chairman, Peter Turner, thanked everyone in the club for their work in the past year and reflected on the enjoyable events and successful fundraisers for village organisations and those further afield. The Club has run a full programme of visits, activities and meetings this year including a successful Open Gardens. This enabled us to donate a total of £2112.30 to various organisations and charities as well as keeping the local birds well fed.

An exciting programme of talks is planned for the year ahead including a focus on gardening: bulb planting, composting and garden planning. Other talks look further afield and promise to be of great interest. Visits are planned locally and further afield and include to Nowton Park, the National Flower Show, Broad Oak and the Wild Flower Meadow in Great Finborough next summer.

We have two events in October. The usual October meeting on the 12 will see Patricia Hodges return to present her talk on John Constable: The man and his landscape. This is an illustrated talk relating to the famous paintings and the landscape as it is today and the story behind and use today of the buildings at Flatford.

On the 19 October we will have a carshare visit to The Place for Plants at East Bergholt. There will be a guided tour and exploration of the magnificent gardens, arboretum, waterside walk, walled garden and plant

centre. This will be followed by teas/coffee and cakes in the café. Details will be sent to members closer to the date.

Mid Suffolk Citizens Advice

I need a new car for work but I can't afford to buy a new one so I've been looking at second-hand options. I've heard so many horror stories about people buying cars that turn out to be faulty. I'm worried that I won't know what to check, especially as I know very little about cars. How can I make sure I don't buy a dud car?

For many people, buying a car is a major purchase and whether it's new or second-hand, the process can seem daunting and complicated.

First of all, where are you going to buy the car? If you're buying from a trader, choose a trustworthy one with an established name with a good reputation. Ideally, they will be part of a trade association or follow the industry's code of practice.

If you're buying via an auction, this is much riskier as you'll have fewer legal protections like the right to returns or refunds so carefully read the terms and conditions before you bid.

If you buy from a private seller, there's a few extra steps to take. For instance, try to inspect the car at their home address so if something goes wrong later, you have a record of that.

Make sure the car's details are correct by using the DVLA's free online vehicle information checker. You'll need the registration number, MOT test number, mileage and make/model of the car to do this check. Also, check the car's MOT history for free on gov.uk/get-vehicle-information-from-dvla.

Keep a copy of both these results (take a screenshot or download the information) as well as the original advert or description of the car. You might also consider getting a private history check to see if the car's been reported stolen, still has money owing on it, or has been in a serious crash. This will cost about £20.

Inspecting the car is crucial before buying. Ideally, do this during the day when it's not raining (scratches are harder to see on a wet car) and take it for a test drive for at least 15 minutes and on different types of road, if possible. Check you have the appropriate insurance for a test drive (either your own or the seller's policy might cover you). Don't be afraid to haggle on the price, and only pay what you can afford. Make sure you get the original (not a photocopy) of the log book and valid MOT test certificate. Never buy a car without the log book.

Often, despite doing all these checks, you might find something wrong with the car after you've bought it. You may have a legal right to a repair, the cost of a repair or some money back but it's on a case-by-case basis. If something has gone wrong with your car and you need help, you can call the Citizens Advice consumer helpline on 0808 2231133.

Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk can provide advice on this issue and much more, including family/relationships, debt, finances, employment and benefits.
